**INDIVIDUALS ARE NOW
SAVING RABBIT SCALPS**

Men from a distance living in the
more remote parts of this county re-
port that individuals have already
begun saving scalps of jack rabbits
in anticipation of the bounty which
is available beginning with the first
of January next.

The Times-Herald is informed, also,
that men are organizing in adjoining
counties for the purpose of getting
rabbit scalps into Harney county
for bounty as soon as it becomes
effective. This comes to us from a
source we cannot doubt and we feel
sure the attempt will be made.

It is also stated that Harney county
has been paying bounty on many
coyotes that were not killed in this

county and some of them not even
within this state.

It is hard to think we have such
"animals" running at large in this
county but it is evident that such is
the case. They are on a par with
the fellow who makes "moonshine"
and peddles it to young boys and is
in evidence around where there are
public dances.

An example will be made of some
of these fellows for it's a chinch the
authorities are not going to allow
them to carry on their unlawful
trade very long. In fact it is likely
they will be caught without any delay
whatever when the authorities
got ready to handle the rabbit bounty.

There is a disposition upon the
part of the people to organize for

the purpose of combatting these un-
lawful manipulators and the same
organization would also employ a
qualified man to act as tax agent for
them and see what is being done with
public funds—keep the members
posted as to conditions in general
so far as the public money of the
county is concerned.

The suggestion that each commu-
nity have a certain man who looks
after all rabbit scalps and to whom
all scalps must be taken for certifica-
tion before they can be bountied, is
one that is having consideration. At
least there should be some way to
protect the county from unscrupu-
lous sharpers as the tax for the de-
struction of these pests is going to be
a big fact in making people pay out
more money.

**OBITUARY

Died Saturday, November 4, 1920,
at the home of her son, Dr. Geo. W.
Taylor, in Burns, Ore. Mrs. Susannah
Taylor, after a short illness of one
week. Although she had been con-
fined to her bed for a year before
her death, she had been in very good
health for the last six months, until
a week before. She was born in
Wayne Co. Indiana on April 19,
1829, where she resided until after
her marriage to Geo. R. Dewitt. She
then moved to Iowa where the hus-
band died. Two daughters were born
of this union. She was married to
Daniel N. Taylor Mar. 8, 1863 this
husband was called to serve his coun-
try in the Civil war and received a
wound from which he died soon af-
ter the close of the war. Two chil-
dren were born to this union Geo. W.
Taylor and Pleasant N. Taylor. She
was a member of the Brethren
church for the greater part of her
life. She had made her home with
her son for the last five years. She
was 91 year 7 mo. and 15 days of age.
The funeral service was held Sun-
day afternoon from the Presbyter-
ian church, Rev. Wicherson, the pas-
tor of that church, conducting the
service. Interment was made in the
Burns cemetery.
