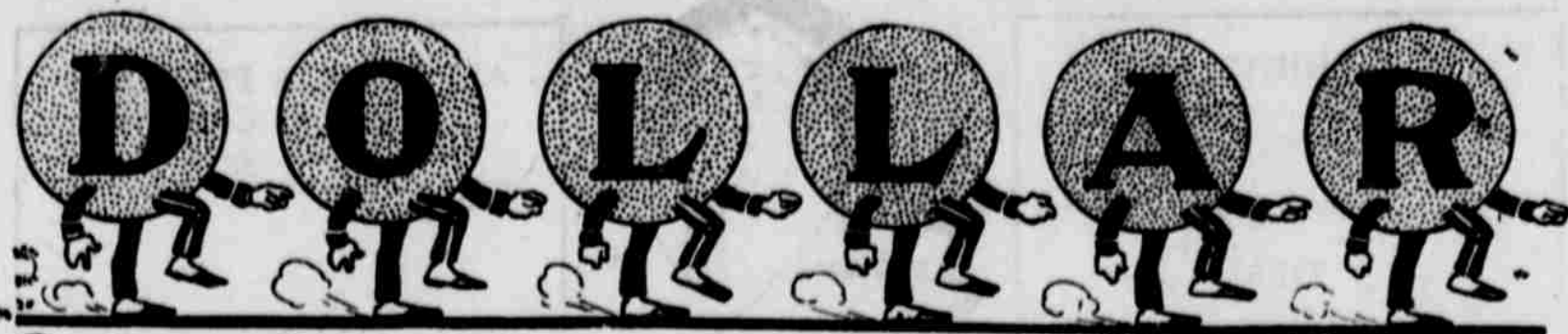

### PLEASANTRIES FOR THE SHEEP MAN

On visiting a local business house the other day where several were assembled a card issued by a big sheep commission house in Chicago was handed us to read. It contained some very interesting things in connection with the wool and sheep industry, more or less caustic in its nature. It applies so well that we decided some of it should be read by subscribers to The Times-Herald who are engaged in the sheep business. It read, in part:  
The sheep market is even worse than the lamb trade. Choice, big, fat, heavy, native ewes are selling at 4c, and thousands of cull to medium ewes from 2 to 3 1/2c. We believe we have solved the sheep business. Quotations on the Chicago market show tankage is selling at \$80.00 to \$90.00 a ton. You can buy the best, native ewes here at \$80.00, and the bulk of the ewes at \$60.00 to \$70.00 a ton, so we advise our friends who are feeding hogs to kill the sheep and feed them to the hogs, as it is the cheapest feed that you can get, much cheaper than tankage and fully as good; then you have the skins besides. There is nothing on the list as cheap as these fat, native ewes now. Not only that, but the packers say they cannot sell the mutton, and if you come to Chicago and buy a few loads for feed, it will help peo-

ple who have sheep to market later on.  
We note by city papers that many people are thankful for the bounteous crops raised throughout the country and are rejoicing over the low prices the farmers are getting for them, but they don't rejoice when the fact is mentioned that their wages will have to come down to be on a level with what it costs to produce crops to sell at present prices. If there ever was a Thanksgiving when the sheepman were not thankful, this is one.  
We are thankful for the raids on the market. (Nit)  
We are thankful for the railroads furnishing us cars two or three weeks after they are ordered (Nit)  
We are thankful for the railroads at the Stock Yards, two or three days after cars are ordered, furnishing single decks instead of double decks, allowing us to pay increased freight charges. (Nit)  
We are thankful for the retailer charging us 60c a pound for lamb chops when he is buying the carcass at 25c, as he might charge us 60c. (Nit)  
We are thankful for the American Woolen Mills raising the wages of their employees 15 to 25 per cent and then shutting down. (Nit)  
We are thankful for our clothing merchants reducing the price of clothes. You can get a fairly good

suit, made largely of shoddy, for \$75. now. According to the present price of wool there is about \$1.00 worth of wool in it. (Nit)  
About the only thing the sheepmen can be thankful for is that a great many of them have been put out of business. It will relieve them from the trying situation they have had and they might get a little rest. Taking it all in all, we don't think the sheepmen have anything to be real thankful for this year. It is dollars to doughnuts very few of them had turkey yesterday, and it is a pretty safe bet that the majority of the laboring men in the cities did.
