

# Farmers' Hand at Last Felt in Congress Halls

For the first time in history agriculture interests will have powerful organization looking after its legislation

Farm Bureau Federation awaits word of Gray Silver before supporting or repudiating any measures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24—All agricultural legislative measures introduced in Congress will receive the close scrutiny of the American Farm Bureau Federation and will either be indorsed or repudiated.

Such is the plan outlined by Gray Silver, Washington representative of the great organization of American farmers, to the Farm Bureau Federation and accepted at the Indianapolis convention last week.

Gray Silver States Aims

"We intend to talk principle and to see that principle is embodied in legislation," says Mr. Silver. "At the present short session, the Capper-Horstman bill on cooperative marketing will come up for discussion and action, a bill of fundamental importance to the farmers of the United States. This bill has been studied in every detail by the American Farm Bureau Federation and its provisions will

be set forth so that all farmers may understand it. Legislation of this character lies at the very foundations of the farmers' existence and in the fight in Congress the producers of the nation will have the full support of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Recording Votes of Congress

"The vote of every congressman will be recorded on a bulletin board at the Washington office of the bureau as a matter of record to show where a representative or senator stands on any important question affecting farmers.

"The Washington office is a clearing house of agricultural legislation.

"We will approve whatever bills are favorable to the farmers' interest and will disapprove those which are unfavorable," said Mr. Silver. "We will assist in framing legislation to meet the particular needs of farmers."

Among the bills to be introduced in Congress shortly are several designed to meet the financial problems confronting farmers and problems of taxation.

Farmers for the first time in history will have a powerful organization to look after their interests at Washington, equipped with specific information and with legislative capacity to frame wise and effective legislation.
