NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that under and by virtue of a decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Harney, made and rendered on the 16th day of February, 1924 and, which judgment and decree was entered and filed in the office of the County Clerk of Harney County, State of Oregon on the 20th day of February, 1924, such judgment and decree being in favor of the State Land Board of Oregon, consisting of Walter M. Pierce, Governor; Sam A. Kezer, Secretary of State and O. P. Hoff, State Treasurer, as plaintiffs, and against Frank Baker, Grace Baker, N. Brown & Sons and P. C. Peterson, defendants therein, wherein judgment was entered against defendants Frank Baker and Grace Baker for

the principal sum of \$2500.00, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from January 17th, 1921, until paid, and for the further sum of \$250.00 attorney fees, and for the costs and disbursements of this suit taxed at \$6.70.
