SAM HAS BEEN ON THE JOB FOR A YEAR

Sam M. Jarvis opened his Live Stock Commission office in Burns on April 23, 1923. During the year closing with the 23rd of this April he has handled over 7,000 head of cattle besides a considerable number of sheep and some hogs. These animals were raised and owned in Harney county and the ownership included 104 persons.

Sam has made good with his efforts to help the stockmen of this county and states he appreciates the consideration he has received at their hands and the confidence they have shown in him. He hopes to do better for them during the coming year as prospects are even better. He has handled stock consigned to him to the best of his ability and his popularity among the growers testifies to their satisfaction. He is a man worthy of their confidence and there is no doubt that he will enjoy

greater business during the coming year as he is now established.

His commission has numerous inquiries for all classes of cattle at this time and while the foot and mouth disease is raging in California and the drought situation is also a disquieting feature, Mr. Jarvis feels there is no occasion for alarm among the stockmen of this section and advises them to hold their stock for their real valuation. He says there are many reasons to believe the cattle market will improve.

On the afternoon of Easter Sunday, the Presbyterian choir, assisted by others, rendered the beautiful Cantata "From Death unto Life," by R. M. Stults. The people of Burns showed their appreciation of this most excellent production, for the house was filled to its fullest capacity. The closest and most sympathetic attention was given throughout the rendition of the cantata. Mr. Stults is deservedly one of the most popular composers of sacred music today and in "From Death unto Life" he has dealt with both the Passion and the Resurrection of Christ. "Oregon must fight the hoof and mouth disease and take every precaution, no matter how California pleads for concessions. If the epidemic spreads into Oregon then it will wipe out the stock industry in this state. No precaution can be considered too drastic to save Oregon," says W. B. Barratt of Heppner, Or., prominent sheepman and former member of the state highway commission. "I do not believe in sending sympathetic committees to California. It is a job for the veterinarians. I'm telling you that if the disease enters Oregon it will be the last straw to the cattle industry here, for it will be impossible to combat it. Think what would happen if it got into the summer range in the Blue mountains. They are about 300,000 sheep range in the Blue mountains and about 50,000 head of cattle. It would be out of the question to quarantine the animals, for they mix around and the result would be that every sheep and every head of cattle would have to be killed. The Blue mountains are only one summer range, but I cite it as a sample of the devastation which can occur if Oregon lets down the bars or takes a sympathetic attitude. Furthermore, if the disease gets into this state Oregon will promptly be given the blame of starting it and even Californians will try to shoulder the ill repute on Oregon. I have seen that happen before." Mr. Barratt reports a wonderful lambing season. He lambed 2400 ewes, getting more than 100 per cent increase. Out of one flock of 800 ewes he had 200 sets of twins and three ewes had triplets.—Oregonian.
