PIONEER RE-UNION HELD JUNE 14th

Mr. W. D. B. Dodson, Former Harney County Resident To Address Big Audience.

The annual re-union of the pioneers of Harney county will be held at Burns on Saturday June 14th. Mr. Wm. Hanley, President, has invited Mr. W. D. B. Dodson, formerly of Harney county and now general manager of Portland Chamber of Commerce to make the principal address, and it is understood, Mr. Dodson has accepted the invitation. Mrs. Belle Hayes is in charge of the luncheon and expects to provide seats for four hundred. The musical program is under the supervision of Mesdames Vella Welcome and Madge Leonard, and the athletic contests under the direction of Clarence Luckey. A grand old time dance managed by Dell Dibble and Austin Goodman will conclude the festivities. All pioneers are requested to bring and wear the badges corresponding to year of membership.

SIGN, SERVICE AND TRIBUTE

Harry C. Smith who built the stone annex to the Burns Garage, conceived the idea and had a road map of Oregon painted, covering the entire upper front of the building. This map was destroyed when the building was gutted by fire early in 1923. Damage to the building was repaired by Archie McGowan immediately after the fire, and now he has caused to be reproduced there at considerable expense, the map of Oregon, dedicating it to the memory of the late Mr. Smith. County lines, main topography, principal towns, state highways and the more important county roads are shown on the map. It shows enterprise and a commendable spirit. It is valuable advertising and of positive service to the traveling public.

Another fitting tribute to Mr. Smith is being considered by the leading citizens of Silver creek. It will be remembered that Mr. Smith constructed the splendid road from the top of Sage-Hen hill to Silver creek with a little assistance from the county and from Silver creek, but principally at his own expense thus connecting Burns and the Sun-tex section with next to a highway for the greater portion of the year. The proposal is to erect a stone tablet somewhere along that stretch of road, naming it after the builder, Harry C. Smith.
