THRILLING SCENES IN
COMING PHOTOPLAY

A film version of one of the most exciting sea stories of recent years is Metro's production, "All the Brothers Were Valiant," based on the story of the same name by Ben Ames Williams. In its screen form it comes to the Liberty Theatre on Wednesday, October 22.

Those who have read Mr. Williams powerful whaling story cannot but remember it as an unusually vivid and thrilling tale. It has all the elements which go to make a thoroughly entertaining photoplay; and with the careful production which Metro has given it, it should be one of the season's biggest pictures.

Irvin V. Willat, noted director of sea stories, has been in charge of translating this splendid story to the screen. Mr. Willat's work in this type of story has brought him widespread recognition; and he had made a picture from the story and cast at his command which should add considerably to his directorial prestige.

Mr. Williams' story is one of heroism. There is a thrilling whale hunt, shown with remarkable fidelity; a bitter battle aboard ship, with two brothers temporarily on opposing sides; a search for pearls under adventurous circumstances; as well as many other episodes which should keep any audience constantly thrilled.

In the cast are several players whose abilities should make the leading characterizations especially vivid. Lon Chaney is seen in the role of Mark Shore, a scheming, crafty seaman, whose sudden disappearance from his ship is for a long time an unsolved mystery; Joel Shore is his father, captain of the schooner which Mark himself once commanded. As played by Malcolm McGregor this part is acted with genuine skill and power. The delightful actress,

Billie Dove, is the only feminine player of any importance in the cast. She appears as Priscilla, the wife of Joel, and she takes part in the adventurous proceedings which form the main part of the story. Others in the cast are William H. Orlamond, Robert McKim, Bob Kortman, Otto Brower, Curt Rehfeld and William H. Mong.

Pola Negri in a sympathetic role in a picture with a happy ending. She marries Raoul but frequently returns to her Apache haunts and helps her friends to secure farther booty from her rich friends in the upper classes. On one of these visits, she is amazed to see Fernand—alive. Her former passion for him is renewed and she tells him where she lives.

In the meantime, Raoul plans a police raid on the underworld in the hope that he may capture the leaders of the Apaches, who are responsible for a series of crimes. While Claire is in the Apache den the police, headed by her husband, arrive. She escapes and that night Fernand comes to her home. At the sight of

her jewels his thievish instinct overcomes his love for the girl. He endeavors to steal them and she undergoes a change of heart and realizes that she does not love her husband. Fernand is shot and in the subsequent alarm Claire and Raoul are finally united as they never were before.

Each succeeding Negri picture goes its predecessor one better, but

"Shadows of Paris" goes "The Spanish Dancer" two better—in other words it's far superior to anything the continental star has ever previously attempted.

LASKY COMMENTS UPON
"BIG BROTHER"

Rex Beach's latest novel, "Big Brother," which ran as a serial in "Hearst's International Magazine," has been produced for Paramount by Allan Dwan.

In commenting upon his picture, Jesse L. Lasky said in part: "I consider 'Big Brother' one of the greatest stories of the season. It was told to me by the author before it began appearing in Hearst's magazine, and we lost no time in buying it. It is a story of New York gangdom and the work of the Big Brother movement in protecting the rescuing boys from evil surroundings in our big cities.

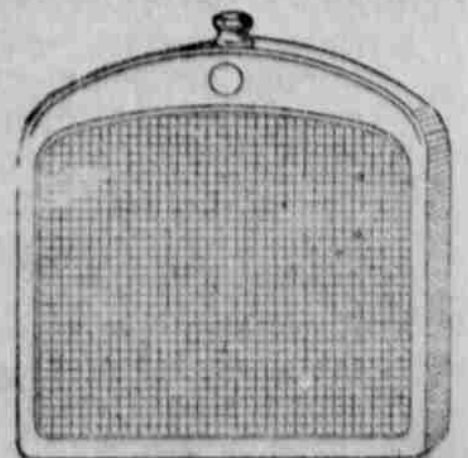
