#### FARM POINTERS

(From Department of Industrial

Journalism Oregon Agricultural College.)

In planting strawberries in Oregon the main thing is to see that the plants are set early enough for the roots to be well established before moisture runs low in the spring. Late winter or early spring is recommended by the experiment station for unknown irrigated districts. Late spring planting is to be avoided at all times as the plants do not have a chance to establish a new root system before the dry season comes on, stunting the poorly rooted plants.

A 100 pound of sulfur application to an acre of several types of Oregon land every three to four years should give a ton or more increase in yield of legume hay on most of the alfalfa lands, says the state experiment station. Subsequent applications are lighter particularly on humid soils. Apply early and harrow in when the meadows are renovated, is the station recommendation.

Hens for winter laying in Oregon do not do well on a whole grain ration. The continued use of straight grain does not supply all the food elements necessary to produce eggs. Steady rations of straight grain result in digestive disorders as well as poor egg production. The grain should be supplemented by ground feeds—commonly referred to as mash in distinction to whole or cracked grains used as scratch foods.

#### OREGON GAINS \$10,500,000 IN GRAIN VALUES

Oregon farmers realized \$10,500,000 more on their corn, wheat and oats this year than in 1923, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, which reports that the national increase in grain values amount to \$550,000,000. Oats alone were responsible for a gain of 2 millions, while wheat brought farmers of this state an added 8 1-2 millions over last year, the report states.

While the Oregon corn crop for 1924 fell considerably below that of the preceding year, the better price this year brought the total income to approximately what it had been the year before. The 2 million bushel increase in the wheat crop this year

brought the value up to \$31,500,000 as compared with \$23,000,000 of 1923. The oat crop of this state this year is up to 12 million bushels as compared to 10 1/2 million the year before with the result that farmers will have taken in 6 1/2 million dollars on this crop as compared with 4 1/2 million the year before.

The yield per acre on corn in Oregon, the report stated, dropped to 27.8 bushels per acre as a result of unfavorable weather, but the profit per bushel to the farmer was 36 cents as compared with 29 the year before. The wet days, on the other hand, were a great help to the wheat and oats production, the former rising to 26.2 bushels per acre as compared with 24.1 the year before, and the latter to 44.4 from 39 in 1923. The profit per bushel of wheat this year was 34 cents where only 6 cents was taken last year and 6 cent profit in oats for the 10 cent loss of the preceding year.

The increased yield per acre of small grain and the increased price per bushel on all grains has aided materially in restoring the farmer to a better financial basis, the Foundation report concludes. The higher grain prices have resulted in higher live stock prices and this has brought a new vitality to agriculture.

#### INDIGESTION

Any refusal of the stomach to care for the food put into it, together with nausea, belching of gas, and pain in the pit of the stomach is usually called indigestion. If you are subject to these symptoms you should see a competent physician. You will very likely answer: "Why? A little bit of indigestion is nothing." In a number of times you may be right but the time when you are wrong means trouble. Indigestion may mean the beginning of serious trouble.

The most frequent cause of indigestion is improper diet. Either the amount of food is too large or the character of the food eaten is improper, or it is eaten too rapidly. It is a wonder that the human stomach does its work at all considering the way it is abused. You overload your stomach with all manner of improper foods and then it balks and you call it indigestion. The prevention of this condition is the application of common sense—regular meals, proper food, but not too much, and thorough mastication.

There are many causes of indigestion other than improper diet and it is these possible causes that demand serious consideration. Not infrequently it is the only manifestation, to yourself at least, of chronic appendicitis, ulcer and cancer of the stomach, gallstones, kidney disease and certain nervous disorders.

Since the first indication of many serious diseases may be indigestion, it is important that you discover the cause of your indigestion at a time when treatment may be effective. If the only thing you need is correction of diet, and you follow the advice of your physician, you will be well repaid. If it is found that your indigestion is the beginning of some serious disease, it may be that this early knowledge will make it possible to establish a cure. If, however, you elect to guess what the trouble causing your indigestion is and guess right, and you are right, you are lucky. If you guess diet and you have ulcers or cancer of the stomach, you have made a mistake that you must pay for. Guess work is poor policy. It pays poor dividends in either health or comfort.

If you are having disturbances and indigestion after meals, and if simple regulation of your diet, such as eating regularly and cutting down the amount of food and eating well balanced meals fails to effect a prompt relief, lose no time in consulting your doctor. Nothing is gained by delay—everything may be lost.
