WILD HORSES ANNOYING

Much complaint in the past has been registered by stockmen because of the large numbers of unclaimed wild horses, worthless from a commercial standpoint because of their size and breeding, which clean up much feed on the desert and summer ranges. It has been contended justly that this feed is needed for stock with a commercial value. It is probable that a bill will be introduced in the next session of the State legislature to permit the rounding up and sale of these animals same as is done at present in California. In Modoc county, forest officials, with the cooperation of stockmen, have succeeded in gathering and eliminating

a vast portion of the horses which ranged from the Lava Beds section to the timbered forest ranges, with the result that the feed annually consumed by these worthless animals is now available for cattle, horses and sheep with a value attached to them.—Lakeview Examiner.

FARM POINTERS THAT POINT

(From Department of Industrial Journalism Oregon Agricultural College.)
Rye grass, the basis of many western Oregon mixtures, is cheap, easily grown, palatable grass. It is established without much trouble and has a tendency to keep itself reseeded. It will grow on white, black, sticky, and low land that is too deficient in organic matter to be good for timothy. The experiment station reports that the English rye grass is most in demand as it is highly prized for pastures.
Alfalfa for seed is not grown in sufficient quantities to meet Oregon needs, reports the experiment station. The poorer land is best selected for the growing of alfalfa as it does well on alkali, sandy, or thin gravelly land in the dry land irrigated areas.

VEGETABLES NECESSARY EVEN IN WINTER MEALS

(Department of Industrial Journalism, Oregon Agricultural College.)

Vegetables in winter diet are just as important as vegetables in summer diet, say the O. A. C. dieticians. Winter vegetables are not so delicate in flavor, but they are healthful and lend variety to every-day meals. As sources of iron, the leafy vegetables are considered the most important, but the others are also important sources of food iron.

Vegetables when liberally used tend to prevent or correct intestinal putrefaction. The mild laxative tendency of many vegetables depends in part upon the fact that they furnish to the digestive tract a sufficiently bulky residue.

When the cost of foods must be strictly limited the diet may often be improved by diminishing the expenditure for meats and sweets in order that vegetables may be used more freely.

Vegetables high in iron are spinach, beets, carrots, and tomatoes. In calcium, carrots, onions, beans, beets cauliflower, tomatoes, celery, spinach, string beans, and cabbage. Beans and peas contain the largest percentage of protein of any of the vegetables and are always a cheap source.

Oregon celery growers who have had trouble from heart rot or other diseases will probably have an increase in the trouble where leaves, trimmings, and unmarketable plants are left on the ground or worked into the soil. It is chiefly in such plants remains that the diseases stay alive over winter, to infect the new crop which the disease has appeared planting. Where possible, land on should be planted to an entirely different type of crop for at least one or two years and new ground chosen for the next crop.
