### FROM ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

The advocacy of a closed season on the coyote has been the cause of much adverse comment among stockmen over the Eastern Oregon section. The fur dealers contend that inasmuch as the coyote is one of the most common of the fur bearing animals that it is a shameful waste to scatter poisoned baits over the range during the season of the year when the fur has no commercial value, and are said to be organizing a campaign against the efforts of the Biological Survey Bureau under supervision of which the work of extermination has been carried on. It is true possibly that many thousands of coyotes have been killed by hunters employed jointly by States, Counties and Federal Government, the latter having supervision of the work. These at a time of the year when the fur had no special commercial value. Considering that the individual skin of the coyote was worth the maximum price paid in the last few years, i. e. \$14.00 it is not likely that any economic loss was made. If these predatory beasts had destroyed but one sheep, one hog or one calf the value would greatly more than offset the individual price of each skin that would have traveled through the various channels of the fur market. One stockman in the eastern Oregon section reports that he knows of three instances during the year 1914 where great loss was suffered by the deprivations of only two or three coyotes. One farmer lost 51 pigs out of a total of 54, say a five hundred dollar loss. Another stockman lost 16 lambs in a single night, still another lost over sixty turkeys in two nights. It is hard to imagine, in view of these facts, that any State, County, or other legislative body would recommend protection of so destructive an animal as the coyote.
