NEW HOME BUILDING METHOD

Senator Stanfield of Oregon introduced in the United States Senate today a Bill to establish a system of National Home Loan Banks to be organized and operated under Federal supervision for the purpose of making loans at low interest rates and upon favorable terms of payment to the people in securing and paying for homes of their own.

The Senator says: "The biggest thing our Government can do in building American citizenship and combating the destructive forces of Bolshevism, Socialism, extravagance, unemployment and unrest is to aid men and women to secure homes of their own."

This is not paternalism, it is just the spirit of practical brotherhood woven into the fabric of better citizenship and better government. The milk of human kindness to sweeten the cup of hard labor.

The Bill is fully as constructive as the Federal Reserve System and the Farm Loan System have proven to be.

If this Bill will do for the city dweller the working man and woman what the Federal Reserve System has done for the nation's banks and industry, or the Farm Loan System has done for the nation's farmers, it will be one of the most constructive pieces of legislation this Congress has considered."

The Bill follows closely the Farm Loan System.

It provides for a National Home-Loan Board consisting of the Secretary of the Treasury and four Commissioners.

This Board is empowered to charter, regulate and supervise National Home-Loan Banks to be organized anywhere in the United States with a paid capital not less than required of National Banks under the National Banking Act.

These Home-Loan Banks are empowered to make loans on improved residential real estate up to sixty per cent of its value; not to exceed \$18,000, in any one loan; payable in monthly installments over a period of five to fifteen years; at a rate of interest not more than two per cent above the rate paid by the bank on its bonds.

It provides for the deposit of securities with a Registrar and the issue of tax exempt bonds similar to the Farm Loan System through Joint Stock Land Banks, and proceeds to be loaned to home owners.

FOREST OFFICERS TRY STUDY COURSE

Seasoned fire fighters, scalers of logs, trail builders, woodmen—all the varied field officers of the U. S. Forest Service in Oregon and Washington—are going to school. Not in formal halls of learning, but by mail, with ranger station, cabin or dwelling as the evening classroom.

The winter study courses which have just been issued by the District Forester's office at Portland, cover such practical things as management of forests, forest fire law enforcement, forest administration, lands questions, grazing, road and trail engineering, maps and surveys, government accounting, forest trespass and public relations. The courses are based on the manuals and handbooks of the Forest Service in the hands of the field man, and are drawn up with the idea of making sure that they are familiar with policies and instructions.

"All of our work is based on the highest use principle of the greatest good to the greatest number," said District Forester Granger. "All our plans, policies and instructions are based on that principle. We recognize that ours is a public service organization and that our field men are the ones who come most in actual contact with the public whom we serve."

The winter study course, according to Mr. Granger, is part of the general plan to improve the efficiency of the organization.

VETERANS URGED TO APPLY FOR BONUSES

Veterans of the World War who have not submitted applications for their bonuses are urged by Lt. Col. C. F. Andrews, Chief Recruiting Officer, U. S. A., to do so at once. The importance of applying at the earliest possible date is urged upon the veterans by Col. Andrews who states: "The War Department is daily receiving cases in which veterans who thought themselves in the best of health have died or have been killed by accident without having submitted their applications for adjusted compensation. Their widows and children, many of them in needy circumstances, receive in such cases cash to the amount of the adjusted credit, an amount equal to approximately one third only of that he would have received in one payment in cash had the veteran made application prior to death. For instance, should a veteran who served overseas for a period entitling him to the maximum amount of adjusted service credit of \$625, die without filing his application, his widow, child,

dren, or other dependent within the restricted class, will receive that amount in ten quarterly installments while if he filed his application prior to his death the widow, children or dependent will receive approximately \$1580 in one payment in cash. Cash payments under the Act become due on March 1, 1925, and payment will be delayed unless the veteran applies a sufficient time in advance of that date to enable the War Department to properly pass on applications and transmit it to the Veteran Bureau.

Veterans may obtain application blanks, have their finger prints taken, and be rendered other assistance in completing their applications at any Army Recruiting Station in Oregon or Washington.

All the ordinary and necessary expenses paid or incurred in carrying on any trade, business, profession, or vocation are allowable deductions in preparing federal income tax returns, according to Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue. Typical expenses of a mercantile establishment are amounts paid for advertising, hire of clerks, and other employees, rent, light, heat, and water, telephone, insurance, delivery expenses, the cost of operating delivery wagons and motor trucks, and incidental repairs to such vehicles, but not the original cost of such vehicles. The expenses of a manufacturing business include labor, raw materials, supplies, repairs, light and heat, power, selling cost, administration and similar charges.

\$2,180 PRIZES OPEN TO CORN FARMERS IN OREGON

Prizes totaling \$2,180 are offered to corn farmers in Oregon counties who make entries in the National Seed Corn Show to be held in Chicago March 2 to 7 under the auspices of the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, an announcement received here states. The show, which is to be held during "Seed Corn Test Week," is intended to drive home the need of a high germination seed corn policy to insure the country a normal 1925 corn crop.

In addition to the five-dollar prize to be awarded to the farmer in the county showing the best ear of corn, a thousand dollars in gold is offered to the farmer in Oregon or the United States who exhibits the nation's champion ear. Another prize of a thousand dollars to the agricultural agent, farm bureau, agricultural or community organization of the county displaying the largest number of entries is also announced.

The show is open to the entire United States. Any person—boy or girl, man or woman—may enter an ear of corn. Parcel post entries will be received any time up to the night of March 7, and each ear must have the name, address, county and state of its owner on a paper which should

be wrapped securely around the ear with the writing on the outside. No ear will be awarded a prize until tested for vitality and disease resistance, the judges to be selected by the American Society of Agronomy.

Entries should be addressed to the National Seed Corn Show, Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, Chicago.
