#### SWEET OR SOUR— THE FAT'S THERE

Every once in a while farmers bring up the fact that sour cream may show a higher percentage of butterfat than does cream shipped sweet, say, twice a week. A shippers' group in northwestern Ohio is even now resisting a demand of a statewide campaign of cream stations for bi-weekly shipments.

Since sour cream may show the higher percentage test, and since payment is on a test basis, the farmers argue that to ship frequently loses them money, to the advantage of the distributor.

Asked by both sides to give judgment, R. B. Stoltz, professor of dairying at the Ohio State University, says that the farmers are right in saying that sour cream may show a higher percentage test than sweet cream, but that they wrong in the belief that higher test under such circumstances makes them money.

Butterfat tests are expressed in per cent, he points out, but payment is on basis of total pounds of fat. What has happened when souring cream shows a higher percentage of butterfat is, he says, simply this: Part of the water has evaporated. But precisely the same number of pounds of butterfat remain in the cream, and the product, therefore, brings just as much money.—Cream Can Chat.

#### PREVENT CARBON MONOXIDES GAS POISONING

Never go to bed with a gas fire burning in a bed room.

Never attempt to warm up an automobile in a closed garage.

If you have a gas heater see that it is frequently cleaned, inspected and that it has ample flue connections.

These precautions are so simple that everyone can understand them and carry them out. Perhaps that is why so many people ignore them. The only way to combat the carbon monoxide evil is to take no chances with it.

Just a few mornings ago seven persons, six of them members of a prominent Portland family and the seventh their physician, were overcome by carbon monoxide poisoning. Three deaths occurred recently on the eastside of Portland from an unvented gas floor heater. Such occurrences demonstrate the urgent necessity of further education of the public in the proper use of domestic gas heating appliances. At this time the only solution is that gas stoves be looked upon exactly as coal stoves and provided with adequate and effective flue connections for leading all combustion products to the outside air.

As the gas stove produces no smoke or definitely irritating fumes, no warning accompanies its production of carbon monoxide. Remember this poisonous gas itself, is odorless, colorless and nonirritating. When

the person is moving about, the gas produces headache, shortness of breath and a weakness of the knees, followed by fainting. Not so when one is at rest. Then it accumulates rapidly in the blood without symptoms except those of drowsiness. Hence the sleeper sleeps more soundly, his breathing becomes deeper and slower and finally stops. It is a painless but ever so thorough exit, as press reports show.

The following resolutions were adopted at a recent meeting of the Oregon State Board of Health:

WHEREAS, Improper and inefficient methods of using gas for heating purposes have resulted in the unnecessary loss of human lives in the State of Oregon and elsewhere;

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Oregon State Board of Health that this Board recommends: (1) The effective venting of every gas-fired room heater and instantaneous gas-fired water heater to the exterior of the building; (2) the removal of all gas-fired water heaters from bathrooms, kitchens, and similar quarters; (3) the discontinuance of the use of gas-fired cooking stoves or ranges or hot plates for room heating purposes, unless same are effectively flued to the outside air; (4) also, that teachers and textbooks having to do with the subjects of hygiene, physiology and household economics, and similar branches, shall emphasize the principle and correct use of and the necessity for adequately venting all gas-fired appliances for the better protection of the health, safety and lives of the users thereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Board recommends that building regulations shall provide that wherever a gas outlet is installed, except for lighting purposes exclusively provision shall be made for effectively venting any gas stove or other heating appliance that may be attached to such outlet.

Taxpayers are particularly urged by Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, to be sure and use the correct blank in reporting their 1924 federal income tax statement.

The short form, 1040-A, is to be used only by individuals whose net income consists of salaries, wages, commissions, and interest not exceeding \$5,000 in the aggregate," explained Collector Huntley. "The large form, 1040, must be used by individuals whose net income from all sources was in excess of \$5,000. The large form must also be used by every individual any part of whose income was derived from business or profession, farming, sale of property or rents, regardless of the amount. By observing these instructions, the

taxpayer will have no difficulty in making out his return of income and, in addition, will save much confusion in the handling of returns by this office."
