EVENTUALLY, WHY NOT NOW?

When our national legislators flash their political juggling act in connection with Muscle Shoals, the country will find it has been treated to an acrobatic exhibition in which the government has received a nasty bump on the head. Had common sense prevailed, the government by this time would have been receiving handsome revenue from Muscle Shoals; we would have turned our liability into an asset, particularly an asset for the farmer. The Ford proposal was concrete and practical. Moreover, it promised action, for the Detroit man knows the value of time.

It is questionable if there are a half dozen men in the nation capable even of a vision of Muscle Shoals as an industrial proposition. Certainly there are not that many who have the ability to wrest profit from the bewildering plant and at the same time provide a powerful safeguard for the nation.

Complaint was made that Mr. Ford would profit from the enterprise. Of course he would have made a profit, and of course he would be entitled to profit, but that his operation would have proved of incalculable value to the country no man can doubt.

We have no comment to make on the Underwood bill either in its original form or as amended, but it is as plain as a pike staff that when all the fireworks have been shot off, the government will find, if it must serve the public interest, it need issue signals of distress, reopen its negotiations with Mr. Ford and see if he will not be generous enough to drag our law makers out of that mess, and save their faces.

The two big outstanding requirements are nitrates for the nation and fertilizer for the farmer. Pettyfoggling politics should not be allowed to stand in the way of either.

FARM POINTERS

Marquis is a good variety to reseed thin stands of Turkey red or other red wheats in the localities of eastern Oregon where reseeding is necessary, says the experiment station. Federation and Hard Federation are the two best varieties for thickening thin stands of white wheats. Hard Federation is particularly good because it is such an early variety.

Marjout and Hanneken barley liberally planted on dry lands and Hanneken and Trebi barley on the irrigated lands of eastern Oregon will help fill the much needed increase of feed production in Oregon, says the experiment station.

Federation wheat planted on the irrigated lands and on dry land sections where good rainfall is present in eastern Oregon will outyield all other varieties, reports the experiment station. Its milling quality is fairly good.

Beekeepers are urged to see that the entrance to the hives are open so that bees may come out on sunny days, says the Oregon Experiment station. By lifting the back of the hive, the beekeeper is enabled to determine by the weight the amount of stores the bees have. The spring rush may be lessened by getting equipment ready for use now.

Overstocking pasture should be avoided during the early growing season is the information given out by the Oregon Experiment station. The new plants are very delicate and can be easily killed if care is not taken. A better stand can be assured by not pasturing too close at this time of the year.

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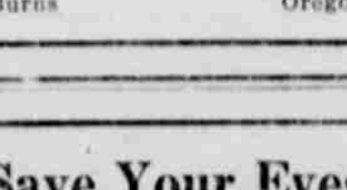
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
