**MUTHER PROTECTION FROM COYOTES OR BOUNTY**

One of the large sheep men of Harney county was in this office the other day and said he had discussed the attitude of the county court of Harney county in regard to cooperating with the Federal Biological Survey in destroying predatory animals with several of the wool growers and they have been frank in their statement that unless they are given some protection and encouragement they'll take the initiative in asking that a bounty be placed on the coyotes again.

This man says there is no question but that the cooperation with government hunters and trappers is the most economical method of keeping down the loss of live stock. It has been proven by actual experience and is found effective. It has the approval of the wool growers of the state. It has the backing of state authorities. The poisoning methods of the federal men connected with the Biological Survey have proven the best by real test and it is being followed in every other county in eastern and central Oregon but Harney.

**FORMER PIONEER WOMAN DIES IN PORTLAND**

The Times-Herald has received a letter announcing that Mrs. T. V. B. Embree died at the home of her daughter in Portland on March 7 after an illness covering several weeks.

She was making her home with her sons in Mt. Hood in Hood River valley and on December 13 and the first part of January, after not recovering satisfactory, was taken to the home of her daughter in Portland where she was cared for until her death.

Mrs. Embree was born in Saline county, Missouri, April 27, 1849. She was married at Corvallis, Oregon in 1868 to Dr. T. V. B. Embree. The family moved to Harney valley in 1885 and settled near Burns, moving later to the homestead near the Embree bridge where they resided for several years, going later to Dallas, Oregon where Dr. Embree died in 1910. There were seven children three of whom survive, Mrs. Lillie Guthrie, of Portland, Clyde and Van Embree of Mt. Hood.

The remains were taken to Dallas where the funeral service was held on March 9.

**RADIO DEBATE MARCH 25**

University of Oregon, March 19—(Special)—Oregon and Stanford debating teams will "go on the air" in the second intercollegiate radio debate in the West, March 25, the Oregon men arguing the question of the Japanese immigration law from station KGW, Portland, and the Palo Alto duo from Station KLX, Oakland, Cal. The teams, although approximately 800 miles distant from each other, will follow the ordinary form and convention of the usual debate.

Oregon has the affirmative of the question, "Resolved, That the Present Immigration Law Should Be Amended to Permit the Entrance of the Japanese on the Quota Basis."

The Oregon-California radio debate last year attracted wide attention. The Bok peace plan was the issue then. The teams spoke from the same stations which will broadcast the debate this month. Radio fans

(Herd Bulletin)

Here primarily for the purpose of locating a factory site and to secure data, Philip Suetter of Welsch, Idaho and J. E. Ziegler of Portland announce that a plant for the conversion of worthless range horses into fertilizer, bone meal, glue and other by products will be established in the Bend country if conditions are found satisfactory.

From information obtained by the two men since coming to Central Oregon, it is estimated that about 25,000 head of mongrel horses now range the country which would be tributary to a plant in the vicinity of Bend. This territory would include Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson

and parts of Wasco, Lake, Klamath and Harney counties.

Accompanied by L. E. Daigler of Tumalo, the two men left Bend shortly before 2 o'clock Monday afternoon to examine a prospective site. If conditions are not found entirely satisfactory here, Suetter and Ziegler plan to establish a plant at Winnemucca, Nevada.

Considerable effort is being made locally to have the factory located in the Bend country, since such a plant would solve the problem of getting rid of the worthless horses which at present are making inroads into forest pasturage of stockmen and farmers in the prairie country.
