OREGON DAIRYING RECOGNIZED

Oregon has been added by the National Dairy exposition to the list of 28 states whose cow owners are recognized in the National 200-pound Herd Honor Roll, reports N. C. Jamison, dairyman of the state college extension service. To qualify for the honor the owner must bring his herd to an average yearly production of not less than 300 pounds of butter fat as reported by a cow test association for the current year ending prior to July 1.

Weedy or dead seeds ought not be planted by the farmers. The seed laboratory at the state college tests

seeds free of charge. All seeds ought to be tested before being purchased, as there is no recourse after the seed is purchased unless they are guaranteed. Care must be taken to get a fair sample, getting it from all portions of the sack or bin. Send all samples to the seed laboratory, at the state college, Corvallis.

Failure to separate the young cockerels from the pullets is likely to result in stunted pullets, says the Oregon experiment station. If the brooder house is crowded it may be advisable to sell the cockerels at a low price as soon as the sex can be determined. Leghorn cockerels can be recognized at from 3 to 4 weeks old by their heavier combs.

Soon after the foal is born the navel should be palated with iodine, says the Oregon experiment station. The navel should not be tied with a string or handled by the caretaker.

Cover crops will be turned under soon. Though it is a little early yet, the Oregon grower is burning the brush and getting the orchard ready. He does not wait for the cover crop to mature, but gets it under at least two or three weeks before the blossoming season, says the experiment station.

Wet mash, fed with the regular grain ration, causes rapid development in growing out broilers for an early market, according to the O. A. C. poultry department. The wet mash should be fed two or three times a day. Ordinary dry mash mixed with milk is satisfactory. The birds are confined in small crates during the last two weeks and fed a fattening ration consisting of 40 parts corn meal and 40 parts shorts mixed with buttermilk to make a batter.

The planting season in Oregon will soon be over, and growers are getting their trees into the ground in order to avoid late plantings. Broken or bruised roots are cut off clean, and the tree set two inches deeper than it was in the nursery. The dirt is sifted well around the roots and tramped firmly as the hole is filled, says the experiment station. If this is not done air pockets will be left which will injure the roots. After the tree is planted the top is headed back to balance the root system.

That under and by virtue of a decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Harney County, made and entered on the 29th day of January, 1925, as appears of record in the office of the County Clerk in and for the County of Harney in favor of C. A. Foster, plaintiff, and against Mabel S. Hooker and Arthur Hooker, husband and wife, and all other persons unknown claiming any right, title, estate or lien in the real property described herein, defendants, for the sum of \$182.11, with legal interest thereon which make the several totals which make up said sum of \$182.11 as shown by tax lien certificates and tax lien receipts, as shown hereafter, held by plaintiff from the 5th day of April, 1921, and with all legal interest thereon from the said date and the several different dates hereinafter set out, and for the further sum of \$7.50 costs of bringing abstract down to date:

WHEREAS, it was further ordered and decreed by said Court that plaintiff's said lien by reason of payment of said taxes on the following described real property situate in the County of Harney, State of Oregon, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

An undivided one-half of Section 16 in Township 30, Range 31, and also an undivided one-half of section 26 in Township 30, Range 30, East of the Willamette Meridian.

FIRST: That there is now outstanding unredeemed certificates of delinquency numbered 3907 and 3913, issued on the 2nd day of February, 1923, and on the 17th day of May, 1923, respectively by the tax collector of the County of Harney, State of Oregon, for the amounts of Forty-six and 90-100 (\$46.90) Dollars, and Fifty-four and 98-100 Dollars, (\$54.98), respectively, the same being the amounts then due and delinquent of the taxes for the years 1919 and 1921 respectively, together with penalty, interest and costs.

SECOND: That three (3) years have elapsed prior to the commencement of this suit since the original date of delinquency of the taxes for the years 1919 and 1921, which are included in said certificates of delinquency.

THIRD: That plaintiff herein is the lawful holder of said certificates of delinquency. That plaintiff herein has paid all subsequent and prior taxes issued against said property, in all, including said certificates of delinquency, amounting to One Hundred Eighty-two and 11-100 Dollars (\$182.11). That there is now due plaintiff herein for said certificates of delinquency and taxes paid as aforesaid with interest thereon at the rate of twelve per cent (12%) per annum; the sum of One Hundred eighty-two and 11-100 Dollars (\$182.11), with interest on Forty-six and 90-100 Dollars (\$46.90), thereof from the 5th day of April, 1921; with interest on Fifty-four and 98-100 Dollars (\$54.98), thereof from the 17th day of May, 1923; with interest on Forty-two and 73-100 Dollars (\$42.73), thereof from April 5th, 1921 and with interest on Thirty-seven and 50-100 Dollars, (\$37.50), from October 19th, 1923.

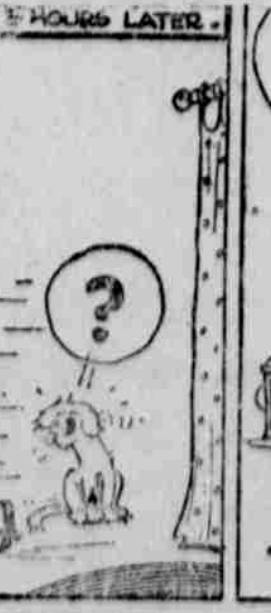
