—Snow in Burns 18 inches deep.
—C. Cecil, of Silver creek, was in Burns on business Monday.
—Mr. Andrews, of Burns, is building a dwelling six miles from town.
—Stages failed to get to Burns Tuesday on account of snow in the mountains.
—Mrs. D. Jamison who suffers from a chronic trouble, is again confined to her bed.
—Query: Why did the snow fall upon every man's house in Burns, except J. Nat. Hudson's?
—Mr. Michaels and wife and Mr. C. Kirkland from Harney City, were in Burns last week.
—Attention is called to the change in the card of the Lakeview attorney, A. C. Broderson.
—Frank McClinton shot and killed a wildcat last Wednesday, on the Haskell ranch, near Burns.
—Mrs. Lizzie Johnson, who has been quite ill at her mother's residence near Burns, is reported convalescent.
—Mrs. Varian, now under treatment for chronic trouble, by Dr. McPheeters, is improving most encouragingly.
—A shooting match for a fat steer took place at Sam King's on Monday, Dec. 31st; 40 yards off-hand, and 60 yards at rest.
—There is a prospect of a private school being opened by Mrs. Denton, at her home seven miles southwest of Harney City.
—It is reported that D. Palmer, of Malheur county, claims to have had about \$22 stolen from him while in Burns this week.
—Mr. McKinney, of the firm of McKinney & Farleigh, saw mill men, came over on a visit to Burns from Harney City, one day last week.
—Robinson & Dodson are doing a lively business at the old stand, and have a full line of goods for the bar on hand. A game of billiards will interest a sporting man, when all else fails.
—A. W. Wilson of the late Livory & Feed Stable firm of Wilson & Cornutt, Burns, left Monday on the Vale stage, to take Mr. Boswell's drive from Vale to Beulah. Mr. Wilson is expected to be in Beulah.

The drive between Vale and Beulah, on the Vale and Burns stage route, will soon be divided in two instead of one as now; one drive will be from Beulah to Drewsy, and the other from Drewsy to Burns; the time will not be changed, we understand.
—Mrs. Harkey, we learn, complained last week, that the inside of her paper was a repetition of that of the preceding week. We are sorry it should have so happened, as in our dilemma, elsewhere explained, we exercised much caution in distributing the extra copies.
—Julian, son of W. C. Byrd of Burns, was so badly hurt last Friday while playing on a cellar door covered with snow and ice, that the services of a physician were thought necessary. Dr. McPheeters says the right cheek and arm are considerably bruised, but the injury is not of a serious character.

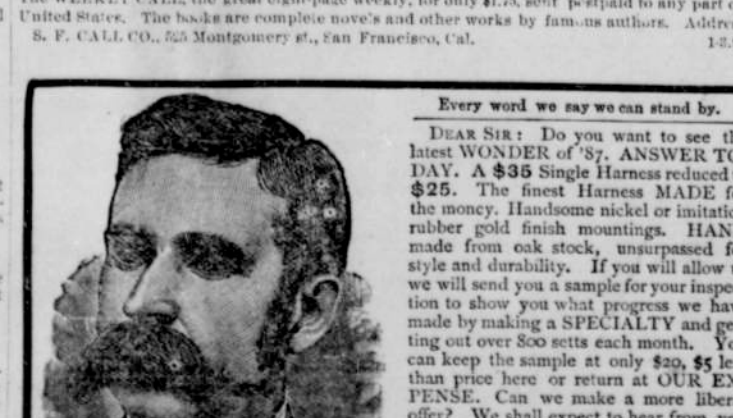
