DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

A democratic state convention for the state of  
Oregon is hereby called to meet at Pendleton,  
Oregon, on Tuesday, April 3, 1888, for the  
purpose of nominating a candidate for mem-  
ber of congress, a candidate for judge of the su-  
preme court, six delegates to the national demo-  
cratic convention, and six alternates to ratify  
the various district nominations, and such other  
business as may properly come before the  
convention.

Said convention will be composed of 135 dele-  
gates, apportioned to the various counties on  
the vote cast for candidate to congress at the  
election of 1886, being one delegate for each  
county and one for every 200 and fraction over  
100 votes as cast.

In accordance with said apportionment, the  
respective counties will be entitled to the fol-

on Saturday, March 24, 1888.

The above excerpt from a letter

by an intelligent gentleman in  
Grant county, shows that the en-  
emies of THE HERALD enterprise,  
who opened war upon it, with pen,  
tongue, and type two months before  
its first issue, and whose efforts to  
prevent its establishment at Burns,  
we met and refuted in our first  
number by a plain statement, are,  
like venomous serpents that have  
had their heads bruised, still ac-  
tively distilling their malicious poi-  
son ("plausible innuendo, doubtful  
insinuation, direct lying,"), and an-  
other statement is in order, which  
we give in clear, unmistakable  
terms, immediately after this para-  
graph.

DURING the recent blizzard in  
Dakota Territory, over 150 persons were  
frozen to death.

SENATOR SHERMAN's attack on  
the president's message was bigoted

SENATOR MITCHELL intends to in-  
sist, either by a separate bill or by  
an amendment to the river and har-  
bor bill, that future work at the cas-  
cades be done by contract. Sena-  
tors Vest and Cockrell, of Mo., and  
others, heartily join in this.—Cath-

OVER one thousand persons per-  
ished in the blizzard that swept  
the eastern states lately. At some  
points, the mercury is reported to  
have fallen to 68 degrees below  
zero.

THE national democratic commit-  
tee will meet on Feb. 22d, '88,  
at the Willard hotel, in Washington  
City, to fix the date and place of  
holding the next national conven-  
tion.

SINCE the last issue of the Long  
Creek Eagle, Jan. 31, its editor,  
"Peter the Poet" was shot and  
dangerously wounded, by one Tom  
Williams. So a rumor from Can-  
yon City yesterday stated.

We may as well admit that no  
President, since Abraham Lincoln  
enjoys so thoroughly the confidence  
of the people as President Cleve-  
land. He has opinions; he is hon-  
est; he has courage. The people  
appreciate a man of his character,  
even when they do not subscribe to  
all his views of public policy. He  
is an extremely dangerous man to  
meet at the ballot box.—New York  
Age, organ of the negroes.

The democratic state central  
committee of Pennsylvania elected  
W. L. Scott, a strong Cleveland  
man, as chairman, instead of Ran-  
dall. The committee "cordially  
and emphatically" endorsed Cleve-  
land's administration, declaring  
that the President "has wisely and  
consistently endeavored to effect a  
reduction of the idle surplus in the  
treasury and to lighten the burden  
of taxation borne by the masses of  
the people. The line of policy laid  
down in the last annual message of  
the President for the revision and  
reduction of the war tariff especially  
commends itself to us as a sure  
guarantee of prosperity to all classes  
of producers and of that genuine  
and honest protection to labor so  
long pretended but never vouch-  
safed by the so-called Republican  
party."

## CORRESPONDENCE.

Correspondence from every part of East Ore-  
gon is solicited—the best way to make a live,  
wide-awake newspaper. Everybody invited;  
and while the editor allows the widest latitude  
possible in the discussion of matters of general  
interest, he does not hold himself responsible  
for any sentiments expressed under this head.

In response to our invitation to  
an open discussion of the land ques-  
tion now before Harney valley, we  
selected an article from an Ex-  
change setting forth the grievance  
of the settlers as endorsed by their  
signatures; also, we give letters  
from well-known citizens on the  
subject—and right here we pause  
to remark that through the rush of  
local matter in the office last Tues-  
day, "Max Muller" got in print an  
unfriendly personal allusion against  
one, and praise of another person;  
this week we permit "Trespasser,"  
a settler, the same privilege, but  
hereafter we refuse any more of our  
very limited space under this head  
for such irrelevant matter:

The Petition of Harney Valley Settlers  
to the Governor of Oregon:

TO HIS EXCELLENCY, THE GOVERNOR OF OREGON:  
WHEREAS, It appears to us from the expres-  
sions and actions of the agent, John S. Devine,  
of the California corporation claiming swamp  
lands under the state, that the most valuable  
lands in this valley have been claimed as swamp  
lands in the report of the two examining com-  
missioners, Col. Elliott and Mr. Harney; that  
said lands will be speedily approved and these  
lands handed over to this California firm.

Therefore, your petitioners, citizens and  
settlers of Harney valley, would respectfully ask  
your Excellency to suspend the action of the  
General Land Office the suspension of  
any action on the report of these commis-  
sioners until the settlers have opportunity to  
prove the character of the land before some  
convenient tribunal.

Convinced that you have the material inter-  
ests of the state at heart, we would ask you to  
consider well the following facts:
