The new grass quit is shooting forth on the foot-hills, indicating that spring is here.

The stock men are busily engaged in swamping and driving the stock on the hills.

The N. Comegys and Wilshire sheep are on bunchgrass and wintered without feeding hay. They are fat enough now for any market.

This is surely the Italy of Eastern Oregon for wintering stock.

Mr. Editor, I have been in Eastern Oregon for 12 years, engaged in the stock business—both cattle and sheep—and can safely say that from the location of this valley, the surrounding mountains and the low desert that lies south of the Malheur and Harney lakes, it is 10 degrees warmer here than in Harney valley.

For browse of all kinds, grease wood, sweet sage, rabbit sage, etc., this section is unequalled. The sheep feed upon this during the winter.

White settlers record but few winters colder than this of 1887-8.

No loss of stock on this side of the lake, considering the amount.

Sheep in Diamond look well. Mr. Porter wintered his land without feeding, and they came out fat.

The snow fell here to the depth of about 4 inches, and laid on 20 days.

This is one of the most fertile valleys in Eastern Oregon. The soil is very rich, and of a clay foundation. It is all river bottom land, supported by the wash from Steins mountain.

The surrounding range has no limits for summer and winter use.

I think it would be well for those seeking homes to visit this section and judge for themselves of its advantages before choosing elsewhere.
