OREGON NEWS.

Clippings from our Exchanges.
East Oregonian:
The construction of water works in Baker city will shortly commence.

The California paper company have completed arrangements for building a \$300,000 pulp and paper mill at Oregon City.

The water works at Pendleton have been a blessing, not only for irrigating purposes, but in the matter of good, healthful drinking water.

Walla Walla is to be lighted with electric light. C. B. Hopkins will put in the plant.

The sum of \$1,180,000 has been expended on the Cascade Locks, near The Dalles, Oregon, and nothing has been accomplished.

Oregon Vidette:
The crop outlook in this section was never better since the floating of the ark.

John R. Curry, for twenty years mailing clerk in the Oregonian office, died Thursday afternoon of consumption.

There seems to be a combined effort among the transcontinental lines to prevent the completion of the Oregon Pacific through to Boise City. The late act of the Southern Pacific providing that all freight delivered to that road must be paid before being turned over to the O. P. is one of the pieces in the programme to injure the road.

Geo. P. Lovegrove has returned from San Francisco.

Late news from Crook gives Cogswell 50, with two precincts to hear from. This makes the judge's majority 163.

Two Indian children have died at the camp south of town, this week, from what is reported as diphtheria. This outfit of diseased Indians should be driven off and their camp and dirty traps burned.

The dam for Lakeview's water works has been completed, and is a model of its kind. J. M. Russell has the contract for the piping, and the entire work should be completed in six weeks from this date.

In the case of State vs. Harry Brown, indicted for murder in the first degree, the jury having failed to agree, were discharged and defendant was allowed to withdraw plea of not guilty to murder in the first degree, and the court accepted his plea of guilty to murder in the second degree. The court then asked defendant whether he had anything to say why sentence should not now be passed upon him. Answering that he had not, it was ordered by the judge that defendant be confined in the penitentiary of this state for the remainder of his natural life, and to pay the costs and disbursements of this action.

Oregon City Courier:
On Friday the republicans distributed dodgers beginning thus, "Launch the democratic boat for Salt creek at Pope's hall Saturday evening!" Money was collected for a "big time" and two piles of barrels were made in Main street to be burnt. But the democrats brought down a flood of Jeffersonian rain on the exultation of their enemies, on account of which the flood of republican eloquence was corked up and the entire hurrah postponed. The weather clerk's democracy is not of the doubtful kind. It is said that, to save pence, the barrels will be burned next week Saturday to ratify the result of the republican national convention.

Valley Record:
The three prisoners who were confined in the Jacksonville jail, broke out the 7th inst., and made good their escape.

FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

Although the seats of many of the leading Democratic members of the house of representatives were vacant during the time that the St. Louis convention was in session, and it required congressmen of the greatest application to sit quietly by and devote serious attention to the consideration of business while reports from the convention were continually pouring in, a fair amount of work was accomplished, and several important bills that have been awaiting action for several months were taken up and disposed of.

A number of bills of special interest to the District of Columbia were passed, among them being a bill making inauguration day a legal holiday in the district, and two bills incorporating cable railway companies.

An amendment was offered in the senate on Monday last to the general appropriation bill providing an appropriation of \$200,000 to be expended in the establishment of a zoological garden in Washington. This project has been under consideration for several years past but it is only recently that active operations have been commenced.

The garden will be established in the valley of Rock Creek, just outside of the city limits, and a more beautiful site could not well be found elsewhere. The ground is rough and broken, and most of it inaccessible for ordinary building purposes. The banks are covered with a beautiful growth of forest trees, and now that the plans have been perfected and congress has taken the matter into consideration, it may be safely predicted that we will soon have a "zoo" which we may well feel proud of.

The greatest anxiety to learn the news from St. Louis was manifested. The president had a special private wire placed in his office, and was constantly in touch with the progress of affairs, but took the result very quietly. He came in from Oak View at his usual early hour, when the laborers are going to work and the social world is wrapped in sleep. After inquiring for news from Sheridan, he went to work, and was alone and very busy when the news of his nomination arrived. He was much pleased, and asked to have the news sent to Mrs. Cleveland at Oak View. He then fell to work again, and at the usual hour gathered up his bundle of papers and returned to his quiet country home near Washington.

The democrats are enthusiastic over the results, and made about as much noise over the nominations as if they were going to have a voice in the election. About three hundred of the most enthusiastic gathered in the Monument ground and a salute of one hundred guns was fired in honor of the occasion.

Since the news of Thurman's nomination was received the red bandana has become the most conspicuous object in Washington. The corridors of the various departments where democratic sentiment a few years ago was at a discount now blaze like an Adirondac mountain side in front time.

The house committee upon public buildings and grounds has at last decided upon a site for the new city postoffice, and it is probable that Washington will soon be possessed of a postoffice building which will be in keeping with the other public buildings of the city.

The San Francisco Bulletin says: The railroad which is to be constructed from Montague, eastward, through Modoc county, and into Nevada and Idaho, is now an assured fact, and it will not be many days before a large force of men will be put to work on this branch of the line. This will cut off the Union Pacific railway from securing the extensive stock shipments it procures from this land. It is said the Southern Pacific company will build their line through Kelton, Utah, making connection with their main overland route at that place.--Ashland (Jackson co.) Record.
