## FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON CITY, D. C., October 24, 1888.

A calm seems to have fallen on the political field; the lull that precedes a great struggle. One significant fact stands out, and that is that Democrats are more certain apparently of New York State than heretofore. The certainty of having the "sinews of war" makes prominent and knowing Democrats assured of success.

Senator Faulkner has returned from West Virginia, and maintains that the Republicans will be very much disappointed at the results, especially in the Congressional gains they hope to make, Goff et al. to the contrary notwithstanding.

Adjournment of Congress has been indefinitely postponed.

The Senate tariff bill, as at last incubated, will not be passed this session, as they see what your correspondent pointed out as the mistake regarding it, viz: the defense as well as the attack that must be engaged in, instead of simply attacking the measure put forth by the Democrats in the Mills bill.

An increased number of Democratic clubs in Maryland in the Republican (Sixth) district, that McComas now represents, presages a change of Congressional representation.

Summer absentees are fast returning, and business is assuming its wonted activity.

Bets on the doubtful States, posted at the pool rooms just outside the city, are 100 to 80 that Indiana, New York, Connecticut and New Jersey will go Democratic.

Senator Vorhees was on one of the trains in the fatal collision on the Metropolitan Branch of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad Saturday, but escaped injury. The wreck was complete and terrible.

The Old Roman is in this city, and spent yesterday at Oak View, the President's suburban residence. He spent a restful and pleasant day.

The feeling is strong here that Michigan will go Democratic.

The hitch in the matter of the adjournment of Congress consists in the fact that Senators hold that the resolution fixing the time therefor should originate in the House, while Representatives contend that the Senate should take the initiative. Much debate has resulted, but the end is not yet.

Careful analyses of the "signs" of the times at headquarters of each of the great political parties, though made from widely differing data, are remarkably similar in general results, causing jubilation among Democrats, and despondency in the ranks of Republicanism.

Much speculation is rife here as to the Oregon Presidential vote, in view of the full knowledge as to the "slush fund" power by which imported votes and repeaters carried the State and re-elected Binger Hermann "too much."

There is much amusement over the N. Y. World's sensational exposure of an impudent scheme by Republican managers to assess Democratic clerks for campaign purposes. The plan was cunningly concocted—the gist being that the clerks, by a liberal contribution for which receipts were given them, secured retention in their places in case of Harrison's election. A World reporter captured documentary proof by assuming the role of a clerk and contributing \$5, for which he got a receipt, and full details of the scheme. Senator Quay is said to be mad!

**FIGHTING WINDMILLS.**

Mr. Jas. G. Blaine and the Republican leaders who follow him are evidently pleased with their present role of the modern Don Quixotes of America. There is in reality nothing they can fight with reason and logic, so they set up a windmill as the imaginary foe that has to be fought with fire and sword and dub it—Free Trade. We know of no statesman, politician or party that advocates free trade or that means free trade. The Democratic party, under the lead of Grover Cleveland, has simply gone to work in carrying into practice what Jas. G. Blaine, Garfield, Arthur, Logan, Harrison, Ingalls advocated some

reduction of our excessive tariff in order to relieve the dangerous plethora of the treasury. That is all. Nor is there any doubt regarding the extent of the reduction which the Democratic party proposes making. It is all embodied in a well-defined proposition known as the Mills bill. Everybody who can read and who has the wish to inform himself can convince himself of what this Mills bill, this great bug-bear, this great wind-mill is. Of the 47 per cent which the present tariff exacts it proposes to take off between 5 and 6 per cent. That is all. If that is the trade, then, indeed, we have been living and working under a system of free trade during numerous periods in the history of this country. The tariff of 1872 imposed a tax of 41.35 per cent on an average—was that free trade? The tariff of 1873—38.07 per cent, under a Republican Congress and Government—were they free traders? The tariff of 1861 imposed a tax of 18.84 per cent, and it was increased immediately, not for the purposes of protection, but as a means to raise the needed revenue demanded by the war to 36.20 per cent in 1862. The law-makers then were certainly not free traders, and notwithstanding the tax had not reached the figures which the Republicans of to-day denounce as free trade.

In fact, the party is compelled to repudiate the professions and opinions of their most trusted leaders of a previous period in order to have an issue with which they can go before the country. It is no fault of theirs that they have not a real enemy to fight. Their thunder has been stolen, they have been disarmed, and all they can now do is to go forth as Quixotic knight-errants and fight wind-mills. The country is at peace, South and North are united, not only in form and by legal compact, but as a band of patriotic brothers, equally interested in the prosperity of the whole country. The bloody shirt is soiled and will not bleed any more. The colored population of the South are living in peace, enjoying all the privileges which the law can afford, are working in unison with their white fellow citizens, formerly their masters, and the poor Republican's occupation, as champion of the colored race, is gone. There are no longer any rebels, the lost cause has disappeared; what is left for the Republicans to fight about? They formerly paraded as the great champions of morality, as the enemies of the saloon, but they had to give up that profession as too expensive in the way of votes. They even go a step farther than their Democratic friends, they are willing to surrender their temperance profession entirely and let the tax on whiskey go overboard. Will not that concession bring back the frightened saloon keeper and horrified beer drinker?

But alas for the frailty of human nature. The Grand Old Party has to resort to misrepresentation, falsehood, and tergiversation. They cannot in reality fight the moderate measure of tariff reduction embodied in the Mills bill. So they fight something which nobody proposes, nobody wants, nobody considers—and that is free trade.

They conjure up a shadow and seek to frighten with it the intelligent American wage-worker. They have tried this trick before and it did not work. Four years ago they predicted all sorts of calamity, confusion, revolution and disaster in case the Democratic party were entrusted with power. The people were not frightened, and as a result of it we had an administration which elicited the admiration of the people; we had prosperity and peace, and more real reforms than under any other administration. They may present wind-mills as real enemies—the people will recognize easily the deception and repudiate them. There is honesty, pluck, manliness, courage and frankness in Cleveland's attitude, in his messages, his letters and his professions, qualities which the American citizen knows how to appreciate. What is the attitude of James G. Blaine and his lieutenants, Harrison and Morton?
