FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON CITY, D. C., November 1, 1888.
The police and fire department parade took place Thursday week, and was witnessed by many thousands of people.
Both departments were beautifully equipped, and made the best showing possible.
Rooms 82 and 83, 2d floor, west wing of the War department, have been assigned as the place for holding the court of inquiry to investigate the defective work in the aqueduct tunnel.
The estimates for the Interior department for the next fiscal year show a decrease from \$96,738,186.51 the present appropriation, to \$94,220,389.50.
The items of decrease are: Government Hospital for the Insane, from \$322,700 to \$250,000.
Howard University from \$24,500 to \$23,500.
Indian department from \$5,831,330 to \$5,474,810.
Secretary's office from \$808,517 to \$722,940.
Patent office from \$797,970 to \$796,370.
The increases are: For Capitol building and grounds from \$96,000 to \$101,600.
Geological Survey from \$627,240 to \$634,240.
Carrie B. Sawyer the celebrated materializing medium, has been holding seances here. Her chaperone says the exposure of the Fox Sisters has done the cause great harm.
Mrs. Gen. John A. Logan, sailed to-day for Europe on the steamship Trave.
Delegates to the national convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, held in New York city, are returned home again.
A little breeze of excitement was occasioned on Thursday by some of Buffalo Bill's cowboys in their efforts to capture a deer that had escaped from its keepers at the winter quarters of the Wild West located just north of the city.
It was only after a long and exciting chase through the streets that Buck Taylor succeeded in lassoing the animal. All of the Indians and nearly all of the cowboys have returned to their western homes for the winter, and the 200 horses, buffaloes, elk, and other animals belonging to the company, have been left in charge of Taylor and a few cowboy assistants.
Mr. Cody says he anticipates no difficulty in reorganizing his company in the spring, and he will spend the coming season at the Paris exposition.
The commissioners have ordered that the circle at the intersection of Massachusetts avenue and 23d street shall be known as Sheridan Circle in memory of the late Gen. Phil. Sheridan, and a magnificent equestrian statue of the general has been ordered, which when completed will be placed in the circle.
The electric railroad which has been under construction here during the past few months has been completed and cars are running regularly. The road is about two miles in length and runs out to the Soldiers Home, and Catholic University.

GENERAL NEWS.
ROSEBURG.
Umpqua Herald: D. McClanahan was fatally shot at his home near Wilbur last Sunday evening. Intending to clean his gun, he sent a child into an adjoining room for it, and in some manner the child discharged the gun. The bullet passed through a partition and struck the unfortunate man in the abdomen. He lingered until 2 o'clock Monday morning, when he died. The deceased leaves a wife and several children.
J. J. and James Cawfield returned on Sunday from Harney valley, and Stonewall is expected home to-day.
Immigration to Oregon over the Northern Pacific railroad alone increased in September of this year 140 per cent over the corresponding period of last year. There were 2080 in the month of September.

Prof. E. B. McElroy, Superintendent of Public Instruction, says the school population of Oregon is from 85,000 to 87,000 between the ages of four to twenty years. Of this number 68,000 are enrolled in the schools, with an average attendance of about 61,000. About 4,000 have been added the past year by immigration.
