All the returns we were able to get in up to Nov. 15 Thursday Noon.

The election at Burns passed off quietly yesterday, there being only a small vote cast—Items.

At the late June election, when the office-seeking clique was out in full force in order to carry this precinct for Binger Herman their utmost endeavor brought out 222 voters, and obtained for Herman a bare majority of 6 or 8 votes.

There was very little electioneering and voters left to cast their ballots without being importuned by politicians—Items.

When a republican politician went to the polls, Tuesday noon and enticed voters to the Town hall on plea of selecting delegates to a County Division convention at Harney, and then produced an alleged threatening document, which he rantingly insinuated it to be the work of one class of our citizens, whom he has declared to be members of "a certain party" (democratic), until surprised listeners left in disgust saying they "had come to a county division meeting, not to swell out a republican electioneering gathering," or words to that effect—wasn't that (and two other efforts) "importuning" voters?

The Ochoco Review claims the Prineville as the Democratic Banner Precinct of Eastern Oregon, an honor we claim for Burns, whose democratic majority is 76 out of 208 votes, and Prineville's 70 out of 290 votes.

THE DEADLY BROTHER

IN THE HAND OF PUTS A BALL THROUGH

The Body of Finley McKrae, and is now Lodged Jail to Await the Result of his Rash Act.

Full Particulars of the Affair.

The following was forwarded to THE HERALD from Canyon City by our special correspondent, who got the latest account up to 9 o'clock Sunday night, and received here at the same hour Monday night.

Francois LeBlanc, alias Frank Black, a sheep herder, on Nov. 9th at 3 o'clock p. m., on South Fork of John Day, shot and seriously wounded Finley McKrae, who was herding sheep at that time.

McKrae's deposition, taken shortly after the shooting by Notary Snow, was to the effect that he was herding sheep on the range when Black came up to him and said, "You have been around my camp all day," to which he replied, "I've been around my own range all day." Thereupon Black pulled his pistol shot McKrae, it is thought fatally. The wounded man began vomiting blood, ran about a hundred yards, then, recovering his presence of mind, walked to the house of K. F. McKrae, his employer, and fell in the doorway.

A warrant for Black's arrest was procured from G. W. Greenwell, Justice of the Peace for South Fork precinct, on which E. F. Sheffield and A. F. Bond arrested him at the house of Mr. Murray, with the pistol still on his person.

Black waived examination, and was taken to Canyon City and jailed to await the result of McKrae's injuries.

Examination showed that the ball, a 44-caliber, entered the side just back of the left nipple, passed in front of the heart, and came out just back of the right nipple, and entered the right arm from the inside, passing through and breaking the bone.

The victim of this shooting was unarmed.
