FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON CITY, D. C., November 8, 1888.
Expect to get considerable gossip in your columns until your political friend "G" takes up his pen to tell you how the victory was won. I confess to the weakness of liking to know that my letters are read with interest by the readers of the papers that honor me as a regular correspondent--I have the vanity to believe that democrats in your country perused two letters over my humble initials with profound admiration; I allude to the times when your compositor placed "H. C." to two of "G's" epistles; I mentally promised that printer-man should he ever journey this way my influence (which though small is zealously exerted in friendship's cause) to a position on the New York Herald.

The fall races attracted the usual crowd at Ivy City in spite of the political agitation.
The new Chief Justice your lady readers will be pleased to learn is a very handsome man, even better looking than any picture of him extant.

He has an unusually bright face, and a strong one. He wears eyeglasses a good deal in running thro' briefs and in surveying counsel, and the effect adds to his distinguished appearance.

On the bench, wearing his black silk gown, Judge Fuller looks quite as large as Judge Blatchford.
