While THE HERALD is not a political paper according to the accepted definition of that term, there will be no hesitation in discussing any and all political questions as they may arise; and, whenever party lines in this county are drawn, THE HERALD will emit no uncertain sound, but will be found an unflinching advocate of the principles and policies of the party now managing the affairs of government.—Salutatory in Vol. I, No. 1.

If, during the state and national campaigns just past, when party lines were clearly defined, we left a stone unturned in our part of the work for democratic supremacy, it was no fault of ours. We did our best endeavor.

Consistency is a jewel. Grant county gave Cleveland a majority. When Grant went the other way in the state election, ambitious republican leaders cried all that was necessary to secure a complete victory would be the establishment of a couple more democratic newspapers in Grant; then made the barefaced assertion that the "influence of our newspaper had split the democratic party right in two, and defeated the ticket." They grant now THE HERALD's influence united the democracy of Grant and gave a democratic majority in the national contest. "It's a poor rule that won't work both ways."

As to our standing on the local land question, we are thoroughly democratic; the public domain is for the benefit of the citizens of the republic, and our paper makes no war on settler, stockman, or corporation that complies with the requirements of the laws governing the acquisition of lands; any other course it will condemn without fear or favor.—Salutatory in Vol. I, No. 1.

We followed that line of policy without swerving to the right or the left, and shall continue it as long as there is law in the land for the protection of the weak against the strong.

The farmer of Harney valley who does not take hold now and prepare to sow from twenty to one hundred acres of wheat in the spring, is not doing justice to himself, the agricultural lands he is holding, nor the public-spirited citizen, but the public-spirited citizen, that greeted the merchant and grist mill, for the advancement of the industrious of the valley.

The farmer needs money, the land must have industry to cultivate it, the valley must have flour for home consumption, in any event, at less than ten to twelve dollars a barrel, and the mill machinery now on hand must not rust from want of use.

Don't be afraid that everybody will rush into grain-raising and you will be left with a surplus on hand. There is a market right here now, for every pound raised.

## FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON CITY, D. C., November 17, 1888.

New York is getting into shape a celebration of the centennial of Washington's inauguration to come off the 30th of next April, and may many of your readers be there to see, as the program will include a grand naval display in which other governments will take part.

Mrs. Cleveland's successor, the next "Lady of the White House," as the title-seeking scorners of our democratic plainness delights in distinguishing the lady who is expected to fitly represent the grace, beauty, and homely and ornamental accomplishments of American womanhood, during the next four years, is Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, who has many admirers in society, here, and will add several ladies of her family to the presidential residence during her husband's term of office.

It is generally rumored that the President feels keenly the ingratitude, of republicans retained in office by him because of lack of proof of "offensive partisanship" yet used the influence of their positions against his re-election.

The Canyon City stage leaving this city at 2 p. m., last Monday, met with an accident between Britten and Sumpter valley, about 7 p. m., that proved serious to the driver and one of the passengers. The stage was going down grade at a lively rate when the hind wheels swerved around on the wet and muddy road, striking a log and completely upsetting the vehicle. The driver, John Brown, had an arm broken, and one of the passengers had a leg broken. The others escaped with only slight bruises. Word was sent to this city from the scene of the accident and Thomas McEwan, proprietor of the line, accompanied by Dr. Boyd, hastened to relieve the sufferings of the injured men.

A horrible dual took place the past week between the Henderson brothers at Blackfoot. A feud has existed between the two brothers, John and James, for some time. James had threatened to shoot John on sight, and that afternoon they met in the billiard hall. Both pulled their revolvers and began firing simultaneously. Four shots were exchanged, and John turned and ran down the street, the blood streaming from a wound in the side of his neck. James fell to the floor on his face, while the blood streamed out of a ghastly wound in the temple. The brothers formerly resided in Utah, and it is said their parents still reside there.

## From Canyon City.

Ed. HERALD: The trial of Bucaroo Jim upon the indictment charging him with the murder of James Bright began on the 20th inst., and the selection of the jury was completed that day.

S. S. Denning, Esq., of Long Creek, for the defence, called J. Nat Hudson, of Burns, to assist. The case was very strongly contested, both on the part of the State by J. L. Rand, Esq., District Attorney, and by the counsel for the defendant.

The case against the defendant was materially strengthened by the testimony of two witnesses, who testified directly to alleged confessions of the defendant said to have been made to them, admitting the killing.

However, after hearing all the evidence, the jury on the third day of trial and after having been out only about fifteen minutes, returned a verdict of "not guilty," and the defendant was discharged.

The verdict receives the approval of the community generally and of about all who heard the trial. It is now thought that the Shirk murder trial will come up next week. The defendant has not yet been admitted to bail.
