OREGON NEWS.

Ontario Atlas; Messrs. Clark and Miller of the Oregon Pacific were in town Sunday. Alvin Foster, aged nine years, was drowned in Rossi's mill slough on the afternoon of the 13th. He and two boys of the same age were playing around the headgate, dropping cat-tails and catching them as they floated under the ice. Alvin fell in and the other boys ran home terrified. They refused to say a word when questioned about Alvin, and searching parties scoured the country unsuccessfully that night. Next morning, however, one of them told where they had been playing, and investigation resulted in finding the body. Mr. Foster and wife are in the Sparta district, Union county, for the winter. Last fall he built a house here to be occupied by Alvin and sister and their grandmother, Mrs. Amidon, so the children could attend school. Mrs. Amidon went up to Buel Clement's ranch, a couple of weeks ago, to care for Mrs. Clement, who was ill, and the children stayed at Mr. Mack's, at Washoe. The body was taken to Union county for burial.

Ashland Record: George, the fifteen-year old son of Geo. Brown, of Eagle Point, met with a sad fatal accident in that section on the 15th. He was out hunting and carried a powderhorn along. While crawling through some brush his shotgun went off, striking the horn which exploded and drove the load and the horn into his leg, tearing a terrible hole in the region of the thigh. J. J. Fryer, who was driving in a wagon not far distant, heard a hallooing noise, went to the brush and found the boy about dead in a pool of blood. Nothing could have saved him from death, as the wound was too vital.

Oregon Scout: From a telegram received on the 16th by County Judge Goodall, we learn that a proposition is soon to be made to the people of Grande Ronde valley, by Mr. Hunt, the railroad magnate, as preliminary to extending his road through the valley. From what we learn he is now negotiating with the Pendleton people as to whether the road shall tap that place or not. When that matter is settled he will know his route and will immediately push the road into this valley, entering it near Summerville. The route he purposes taking is directly through the valley to Union, and from here up Catherine creek to the Park, through Eagle and Pine valleys to Snake river, thence up the river to into the Boise valley. It is needless to say that the road would take four-fifths of the trade of the entire country through which it passes. We are assured by those who ought to know that this road will be in operation inside of eighteen months.
