In 1878-9 it was discovered that the water which appears to seep from Warner Lake into the numerous shallow lakelets in its vicinity, when evaporated, left a bed of salt, such as is known as "rock salt." This was taken out and sold in the local market by Messrs. Jones & Bond of Lakeview P. O. for stock salt. Its freedom from alkali and the several years' test of its value as salt, encouraged these gentlemen to purchase a mill three years ago and enter upon the manufacture of the various grades of salt in demand. Two of the larger lakelets lying from one to two miles from Warner were allowed to retain 14 inches of hard rock-salt for a floor, and when the next season's layer of salt was deposited, it was taken up clean, pure, and white off the floor, and ground into table, dairy, and meat salt, which is having an extensive sale. We are practical believers in patronizing home industries, particularly when the articles are good, fresh, and cheap as can be furnished by distant manufacturers, and it is believed this salt can be sold in the Burns and Harney markets
