HARNEY COUNTY ITEMS.

An Interesting Investigation before the Land Office.

The "Contest-Room" at our new Burns Land Office was first opened for business on Tuesday of this week at 4 p. m. At that hour, in response to a summons issued on Saturday last, there appeared before the Register and Receiver several well-known practitioners in Land Office matters, who had not yet qualified, as required by the "Regulations" of the General Land Office, for admission to practice before this District Land Office either as Attorneys or as Agents.

As special publication of the requirements under such "Regulations" had been made in several newspapers in this District, on September 12th, (the EAST OREGON HERALD being one of the number), it became an important subject for inquiry by the Register and Receiver why any persons should undertake to practice before this Office in capacity of Attorney or of Agent who had not yet presented any proper credentials of such character.

Inspector Harbison, of the General Land Office, appeared on the part of that Office and took charge of the investigation.

The principal cases in question were those of Mr. A. W. Waters (familiarily known in this community as "Captain"), Mr. W. W. Caldwell, and Mr. George Sizemore. Each of these gentlemen took charge of his own case. It was developed in the "Captain's" case that he is not a regular attorney-at-law, and therefore could only qualify under the "Regulations" as an "Agent." He claimed to be so qualified—as an Agent only and not an Attorney—before the Lakeview Office, but that he had not yet received from that Office his 'certificate' of such standing, because of the long course of the mail, he having already written for such 'certificate.'

In the case of Mr. Sizemore, it was likewise developed that he is not a licensed Attorney-at-law, and could not therefore qualify to practice before a Land Office in other capacity than that of an "Agent" for parties. In such capacity he also would, if time were allowed him, undertake to qualify. As to Mr. Caldwell's case, it appeared that he alone, of all the persons present who had been 'summoned,' was a regular and duly licensed Attorney-at-law, and that as such he could qualify both as an Attorney and Agent, upon presenting a 'certificate' in regard to his professional standing as an Attorney from the Judge of the United States Court or the Judge of this State Circuit. Such 'certificate' Mr. Caldwell undertook to obtain in due course and at an early day. There was also present, as an interested party, Dr. Embree, who, not being an attorney-at-law, indicated his purpose to duly qualify as a practicing "Agent."

At this point, and upon such showing by the several gentlemen concerned, it was indicated by the Register and Receiver that a certain reasonable and further margin of time would be accorded to them to qualify as 'practitioners' on behalf of claimants or contestants having business before this Land Office, and according to the "Regulations" above mentioned.

Altogether, it was an interesting and important investigation, and it promises good results for the future efficiency and high standing of our new Burns Land Office—alike of benefit to 'settlers,' and a credit to the Present Administration.

Under a decision of January 18, 1889, 20,000 acres of this alleged swamp land was decided to be hilly and mountainous. Regarding the 58,000 acres remaining, Secretary Noble decides he will not entertain a motion for a review.
