EDS. HERALD: I send you a few items from Del Norte, but items are scarce here.

Henry Page is getting in lumber for a new house on the Red-S.

George Stoval has been quite sick for the past few days, but is convalescing.

There was to be a picnic at Warm Springs last Sunday but did not learn the results.

Several of our neighbors are moving to Harney for the winter for better school facilities.

Chas. Morrison arrived from the railroad, Saturday, a little under the weather, but able to be around.

Mrs. May Morrison, Miss Rosa Dickinson, and one or two other parties, spent twodays at the Warm Springs, last week.

Dr. Anderson was in our neighborhood last Saturday, looking for witnesses for next week court. Del Norte will be well represented there.

J. McCune is stretching the third wire on his fence and putting stays 4 ft. apart, making a good fence; he has also, built an addition to his dwelling.

The fire having cleaned off all old tules and other rubbish, the young tules and wild grass next year will make fine hay, or excellent winter pasture.

Monday night a nice little shower settled the dust, and, I hope, has extinguished the fire, as I cannot see any smoke from toward the lake. Still cloudy and prospects of more rain following.

There are about 20 buildings now up and in course of erection in a radius of about 3 miles east of the river on unsurveyed land, and room for twice that many on as good land as Harney valley affords.

We had a evening hurricane here last Sunday evening that filled the atmosphere with dust, ashes, hay, house-roofs and other debris for a few minutes, but the duration was so short but little damage was done except to hay racks and one or two out-buildings.

Messrs. Sitz & Bros. have plowed and scraped out an excellent watering place for their stock and have utilized the excavated earth to make a road across the slope—thus killing two birds with one stone, giving a good road in wet seasons, and plenty of water in dry seasons for stock.
