PUBLISHERS AND PROPRIETORS. NEWSPAPER LAWS.

1. A postmaster is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and the reason for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment 2. If any person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages, or the Publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether his taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance till payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the postoffice, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not is responsible for the pay.

4. If a Subscriber orders his paper stopped at a certain time, and the I ablisher continues to send, the subscriber is 1, and to pay for it if he takes it out of the pot, all the . This proceeds on the ground that a ma must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have deef led that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post office, or leaving them uncalled for, withou paying for the same, is prima facia evidence of intentional fraud.
