LATEST BY STAGE. Congress adjourned for the holidays to Jan. 6th.

Arcata, Cal., had a bridegroom of 85 and bride of 56 this month.

Feb. 3, the New York Japanese murderer, Schieck Jungio, will be legally killed by electricity.

Dec. 17, great honors were done Stanley and the Zanzibaris at Zanzibar.

Kilrain was convicted of assault and battery on the person of John L. Sullivan, and sentenced to pay a light fine.

Arbuckle churches were thrown open to shelter animal victims from the severities of the late storm in California.

The Blythe trial has reached the testimony on the behalf of the Gipsy claimant of the deceased millionaire's fortune.

The influenza that started in Russia this winter and swept over Germany, is now reported as having nearly prostrated 100,000 people in Paris.

Dec. 16, a girl life-taker, Louise Epperson, shot and killed Julius Hoper, near Bakersville, Mo., for persisting in teasing her about her admirers.

Dom Pedro refused all temptations to engage in a contest for the recovery of his throne, but says if the people of Brazil want him to return, he will do so.

Harry Thies, while the ground was dry, planted 100 bu. of grain a year ago, near Lovelock, Nev., and now the soil is wet, believes he will realize 45 bushels to the acre next season.

The monied men of St. Louis headed by Father Phelan, are standing by Chambers, the murderer of Frank Bowmen, with money and influence. Dec. 16, he was released on a bond of \$50,000.

Lawrence Barrett's theatrical engagements have all been canceled; some lymphatic glands were removed from his throat, Dec. 16; so soon as convalescent he will go to a watering-place for rest.

Dec. 15, Mrs. Gen. Booth died at London. Whatever may be thought of the methods of the Salvation Army, and its leaders, there can be no doubt that the religion of Christ has lost a noble-hearted worker in the death of this lady.

In Williamsburg, New York, Dec. 16, Walter Elliott, while in the hands of the undertaker and his assistants making the necessary preparations for burial, suddenly opened his eyes and asked what they were doing with him. It is believed he will recover.

A wife 28 years old, in Providence, R. I., spanked her 19 year old husband because she couldn't make him go to school. His application for divorce shows what a woman is capable of doing with a husband when she is older and stronger than he is. Divorce was granted with unusual promptitude.

The particulars of the London West End scandal are said to be too vile for publication; the Earl of Euston was charged with being implicated in the scandal by the editor of the North London Press, and a grand jury found a true bill against an editor so lost to a sense of what is due his "betters."

A more coarse, therefore, disgusting picture than the wealthy American heiress, Miss Caldwell deliberately paying \$100,000 for the right to bear the title of princess, is not drawn. ## STATE NEWS.

Reward of \$1,360 offered for murderers of young Cain. Oregon sent 100 Christmas trees to San Francisco.

The old pioneer, J. M. Taylor, at Bridge creek, Crook county, died Dec. 13th.

S. B. Huston of Hillsboro, is reported as a democratic suggestion for congressional honors.

Dec. 22 engineer and fireman badly injured by a smash-up, near Baker City, from spreading rails.

Hon. R. A. Irvine and Gov. Penneyer are mentioned as democratic candidates for governor of Oregon.

F. C. Baker, of Salem, is a republican favorite for Secretary of State, and J. F. Holman, of Astoria for public printer.

A humpung under the name of Harvey A. Boyse, is soliciting and obtaining subscriptions to write up towns for the Chicago Inter-Ocean.

On the grounds that voters were allowed to congregate within less than 100 feet of the polling place, there is prospect for contesting a late town election.

In Spokane some time since a corpse was attached and in Pendleton the sheriff attached a \$75 Bible belonging to C. C. Hurt, as part payment for the capture and trial of T. F. Garner.

Dec. 14, purses aggregating \$4,900 was voted at a meeting of the Portland Speed Association; or a four days meeting next June, classes of the trotting event to range from 2:22 to 4:50.

Telephone-Register, Dec. 19, reports an accident that may result in death. Charles Star was returning from duck shooting, and as he was getting out of his cart to open a gate, his gun exploded, tearing the muscle from the elbow to the shoulder, exposing artery and nerves for two inches. The artery is liable to open and death ensue when suppuration takes place.

Some time since W. T. Casey appealed from the decision of the U. S. land office at The Dalles, in rejecting his filings on a piece of land at Powell Buttes, listed to the W. V. & C. M. Co., though the land was just out of the six-mile limit. The commissioner of the general land office has just rendered a decision in Mr. Casey's favor, allowing his filing. It is a valuable tract of land, and is well worth contesting for.

At an auction in St. Louis, Dec. 18, 4 rifles of the type that hung "Gen." Rafferty, Sept. 1851 brought \$15; the shovel with which McGarry killed sheriff Nash, about \$10; Bald Knobber Wiley Matthews' pistol, a good sum; knife Bill Knight killed P. J. Harvey with, a fair price; the knife that cheated the gallows of Jerry Pagels by cutting his throat, \$37; handcuffs, spurious, counterfeit moneys, etc., were sold to the morbid persons present at good rates.

A telegram, Dec. 17, from Walla Walla, gives the following account of the late Colfax shooting: Ben Blandon, a brutal fellow that delights in crime, with no care for consequences, nor his own life, was on his way to answer to the charge of assault on an aged man with a deadly weapon; on recognizing several witnesses against him in a crowd, he began firing at them, killing Thos. Flick, woundng Bradon, Bernette and Daval. The wife of Flick as he gasped his last, raising his body appealed to the crowd to avenge his death, which so infuriated the men in hearing, they were with difficulty restrained from rescuing the prisoner from the sheriff and hastily summoned deputies, and lynching him on the spot. So fearful is the sheriff that the people may capture the jail, he has taken Russell the murderer of Daniel Cauty to a more secure place.
