## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

**FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD**  
Political, Social, Religious, and Educational Events.

**Murders, Suicides, Thefts, Accidents, Losses by Fire, Flood, Rail, Cyclone and Blizzard.**

Congressman Taulbee, who was shot by Kincaid, Feb. 28th, died in Washington D. C., March 11th, Kincaid was re-arrested.

Senator Mitchell, March 11, introduced a joint resolution in the Senate providing for the election of United States Senators by a direct vote of the people.

We read an account of one of our exchanges of the death of Matilda Ruby, at Daywick, Ky., at the extreme old age of 123 years. The record of her age is authenticated in a family Bible in her possession.

William Baldwin, an aeronaut, on March 2d, at San Francisco, ascended in an air ship, 1,500ft. Made the descent from that perilous height in a parachute without injury, except a ducking, coming down in the water.

At a meeting of the Presbyterian Ministerial Union, at San Francisco, March 3d, a paper was read by Rev. J. M. Thompson, favoring cremation. Nearly all that were present agreed with Mr. Thompson, as was shown by the remarks that followed.

It is officially announced from Paris, March 13th, that the king of Dahomy, accompanied by his female warriors, retired to Lamar after remaining at Godomey four days and not daring to attack the French posts. The rest of his army remained at Godomey, erecting fortifications. The loss of the Dahomians during the campaign numbered 1000, including a female general.

The oldest lawsuit ever known is now in progress of trial in the highest Russian court in St. Petersburg. It was originally brought 500 years ago against the city of Kamenez-Podolsk by the heirs of a dead nobleman to recover several thousand acres of his real estate, which has been confiscated by the municipality. The testimony is weighty. There are forty-five tons of the manuscript—S. R. Democrat.

John O. Pendleton, who was unseated by a vote of less than a quorum, will make a claim upon the Treasury for pay as a member of the House of Representatives from the first Congressional district of West Virginia. Upon the disallowance of this claim by the accounting officers he will proceed to bring suit in the court of claims, and in case of an adverse decision, will appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States. The object is to test Reed's rulings.

A bill has been introduced in Congress by Senator Vance, to establish in every county of each State in the Union an agricultural depository, under the control of the treasury department, in which the owners of grain, cotton, tobacco, etc., may deposit their products, receiving therefor a ware house receipt and treasury notes equal to eighty per cent of market value of the deposit, redeemable at any time on payment of the sum advanced and interest. The bill appropriates \$50,000 to carry out its provisions.

State Rights Democrat: An Eastern despatch says that Senator Dolph is getting a great deal of attention in the newspapers, some of them criticizing him severely, because he is chairman of the special committee investigating the newspaper correspondents, and because he reported a resolutions to imprison the correspondents who refused to answer questions. He is especially by the men who would be subject to this punishment. A man makes a big mistake when he officiously goes to inquiring into the source of a newspaper's news. It is a paper's business to get it the best way it can. Oregon's pompous Senator will come down a peg before the reporters get through with him.

## STATE NEWS.

Work will begin in a few days on a woolen mill in Corvallis.

A bill has passed the House authorizing the construction of a bridge across the Columbia between Oregon and Washington.

At Sissons, situated on the Southern Pacific, near the California line, the snowfall, was twenty-two and a half feet.

We see it stated in the Ochoco Review that the livery stables are doing no business on account of the scarcity of feed.

The inhabitants of Wilber Station, Oregon, were visited by a cyclone, March 7th. No damage reported except the uprooting of trees in its path.

A brakeman, named Gardner, on the Southern Pacific railroad, coupling cars fearing he might be caught between them jumped back and falling broke his ankle.

From our exchanges we gather the news that W. R. Ellis, of Morrow county, and H. B. Miller, of Josephine county, are aspirants on the Republican ticket for the position now held by Binger Hermann.

States Right Democrat: Prof. Clyde Cook, director of the art department of the Willamette University, has won a prize of \$250 from the publishers of the Youth's Companion, for work in designs against over one thousand competitors.

The average arrival of immigrants at Albany is at least fifty a week according to the reports at the baggage room of the Southern Pacific depot. Every train brings some looking at the country, many determined to locate with us—Democrat.

Senator Mitchell is making an effort to have the Bishop Scott Academy, at Portland, recognized by the Government as a military school with a retired army officer as a professor of military service and tactics. J. W. Hill recommended Capt. J. A. Sladen for the professorship.

The East Oregonian gives a fearful loss of stock in the Big Bend country. One man named McEntel, had 100 left out of a brand numbering 1500. Another lost all but 17 out of 350 head. It was thought that very few cattle would be left alive at the close of the winter.

If accounts be true, the loss of stock in Harney county has been 75 per cent.—Ochoco Review.

We take pleasure in making the statement that the above is not correct, according to later information obtained from stockmen, we are led to believe the loss will not reach half that amount.

A young gentleman in Salem was given by a young lady, the word "enough" and asked to transpose it so as to form two words meaning not enough. He struggled over the problem some time, but finally a smile illuminated his countenance. He wrote with a pencil on paper, "one hug," and handed to the lady.

A young woman, 18 years of age, named Ida Anderson, was found dead in a lodging house at Spokane Falls, March 7th. On investigation it was found she died from the effects of abortion. The man that figured in the affair has skipped, but it is thought he will be found. Startling developments are expected.

Canyon City News: The stage office resembles a city warehouse from the large amount of heavy freight stacked up there awaiting transportation to Burns. Their daily mail from Ontario has been unable to run this winter, therefore the proprietors of the tri-weekly line from Canyon have had to supply that whole empire with mail without extra remuneration, being often obliged to leave passengers here in order to take out the mail and hauling freight has been an impossibility. Burns should assist our people in having this service increased to a daily.
