Weather-Crop Bulletin No. 2.

Of the Oregon State Weather Bureau co-operating with U. S. Signal Service, Central Office, Portland, Oregon, for the week ending Saturday, March 22, 1890.

The temperature and sunshine have been below the average; the rainfall about the average. The temperature has generally been above the freezing point. The weather has been partly cloudy to cloudy. The rainfall has been light, but generally well distributed.

The soil, except in uplands, is wet for plowing, hence the spring seeding is retarded. The snowfall and the rains of the past winter have been such as to moisten the ground to a greater depth than has been known for years.

The winter wheat crop is generally reported in good condition, but a few days of warmth and sunshine are much needed to give it a good start. Grass is growing finely and stock is recuperating from the effects of the short feed. Where soil operations can be pushed a large acreage is being prepared.

Fruit, etc., Fruit and ornamental trees, and shrubbery are developing their buds; on the latter, leaves are beginning to show. Peach trees are in blossom in Lane county. The cold winter has injured the peach crops to some extent. Several weeks of fair weather and warm sunshine are needed to allow of spring work, the starting of the grain and the development of the buds of trees etc.

On March 22d, 1889, peach, apple and cherry trees were in full bloom, leaves on ornamental trees were out. Flowers were blooming and many varieties of vegetables were in the market in many parts of the State.
