Quite a number of persons in town on Sunday. C. W. Jones was in Burns, the county seat, on the 4th. Isaac Foster was in town on Saturday and Sunday last. A. J. Jenkins of Prineville is visiting our town this week. The doctors, think Harney county very healthy. No sickness. We shook the hand of Robert Terrell on the street Tuesday last. Only one, of our commissioners is present at court this term. Wm. Altnow. Chas. Frye of the Steen mountain country, is in town this week attending court. E. E. Purington in company with Mr. Fitzgerald, were in town yesterday and today. Col. Wm. F. Helm, special agent of the State Insurance Company, is canvassing Burns this week. Minnie and Dell Gianini, who have been visiting their father at the Warm Springs, returned on the 2nd. Robert Drinkwater and W. E. Alberson, of Harney, were in town the first of the week, attending court. The races, commencing on the 27th inst., in Burns, are going to be ahead of anything of the kind we have ever had in our town. According to the returns so far received, Harney county has a population of 2,692. This we think is about the actual population. We saw Milo Cushing in town on last Monday, he is still on crutches, and thinks it will be some time yet before he will be able to work. B. Huntington, attorney-at-law a resident of The Dalles, Oregon, is in Burns on a visit to his brother, J. B. Huntington, register in the Burns Land Office. Hon. J. W. Strange, writing to a census enumerator of this county, says: "Of all the gigantic disgraces this country has ever known, your mail service beats all." Jack Gregg, whose ranch is seven miles north of Burns, on Silvies river, raised on 14 acres, 70 tons of rye hay, and still some people argue that Harney valley is no good. We are informed, that on Monday the 4th inst., Thomas Vickers lost, by fire, his barn, and about 60 tons of hay. The origin of the fire we learn, was some children playing with matches, and accidentally set fire to the barn. We received a letter from T. J. Morrison written at Dallas, Polk county, and dated July 29th. Mr. Morrison writes he expects to start for Harney valley in two weeks, and will build in Burns immediately on his arrival. He also writes while below he intends buying a stock of furniture which will be shipped to Burns. We are informed by a reliable party that the mail contractor on the Ontario route, is running a daily stage as far out on the route as Vale, where the mail is allowed to accumulate for several days, before being carried any further. The little daily scheme on that end of the route we do not think will be of any benefit to the contractor, we do not think the citizens of Vale, will champion the cause of the contractor before the throne of grace, knowing the condition of our end of the route. The spring term of the school in the Buchanan district closed last Friday. Miss Ida Roberts, teacher. We are informed by one who was present, that the school stood an excellent examination. They were examined by persons selected that day for the purpose, and questioned closely upon their different studies, one little boy Johnny Ragon, answered correctly 150 questions. One very remarkable fact connected with the school is, perfect attendance, not a single pupil during the whole term was absent a day or tardy. COMMUNICATION. WASHINGTON, D. C. The "boycott" idea as a redress for the fills following in the train of the force bill, and which was suggested by Editor Howell, of the Atlanta Constitution, finds little favor with democrats in congress either from the North or South. Senator Carlisle, although new to the senate, is an old head in legislation and a man whose opinion is valued, says that the south does not want to imitate the radicals of the north by entering upon a sectional crusade. It is his idea that the conservatism of the country will make the republicans sick of forcebills as well as all other legislations which is the basis of a rotten political speculation. The north is now too much wrapped up in the development and prosperity of the southern section to permit a few scheming politicians to waste their millions of investment with nothing in return but the bare prospect of a temporary political advantage. These views too, are but the echo of a general sentiment among democrats in Congress. And to there credit be it said, there are also a few republican senators who take this broad view of the situation. Nothing would better suit the radical element than the "southern communities organization" to fight the prospective law, as they could use it as a whip to drive into submission those members of the party who are against force bills and now stand ready to oppose such legislation. The democrats, therefore, want the people to possess their souls in patience, the force bill is not a law yet and there are excellent chances that it never will be a law. The speculation, pure and simple, of President Harrison and family in suburban district property is still the subject of unfavorable comment here, which is rather intensified by the fact that Mrs. Harrison, in her Cape May interview, went out of her way to impugn the motives of President Cleveland in his purchase of Oak view, she then asserted in brief, that hundreds of thousands of dollars were spent in the vicinity of President Cleveland's country residence the presumption being, of course, that government money was spent to increase the value of the Cleveland property. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Large sums of money have been spent in the neighborhood of "Oak view" but it has been private capital alone expended with the view of placing attractive villa sites on the real estate market and the principal investors in this direction have been republicans real estate speculators, like John C. Bullitt, of Philadelphia men of honor and means, too, who have faith in the reality, values in the District. How is it, though, with "Glen Echo"? The republican editors think they have scored a point by the assertion, under the inspiration of the administration, that the property is not in the district, but is located in Maryland. Just so, and that is another and a good reason for getting the presidential family in on the ground floor. Aerial navigation is not yet a success and the speculators who are booming "Glen Echo" have not yet started a balloon line to reach the prospective country seat of President Harrison. Indeed, a good smooth roadway is needed, and it is needed so very easily that even the presidential lots had been a "gut" instead of a "purchase," they would have proved a re-merchandising investment to the speculative owners of "Glen Echo." I had almost forgotten to say that this road will run for almost its entire length through district land, as you know we in Maryland, just across the border, as congress must appropriate the money for the improvement of this road and as the resident must sign the bill after it is passed, it is easy to see, as is claimed that the President's property interests are not even remotely connected with his official position. The mere presentation to Congress of the correspondence in the bearing sea trout, is not a legislative action at this time. Congressmen of both parties are agreed that there is nothing for congress to do so long as the diplomatic negotiation are in progress. The leading democrats do not hesitate to praise Mr. Blaine's management of the American case, but they say, that the significant fact, that, notwithstanding of importance, by way of improvement, is as suggested since Secretary Bayard resigned the management of foreign affairs.
