The Farmer's Alliance can accomplish good for our government and people by temperate, calm and patient work. But if an effort, on their part, be made to obliterate party distinction, or by forming a new party, they hope to crush the old parties, (democrat and republican) then their influence stops.

The republicans have held the reins to long to quietly submit. If they are compelled to, to relinquish their hold on the government it will be a hard "let go." And on the other hand, the democratic party is receiving strength every day, and after a fight of 25 years, and believing that they have victory almost within their grasp, does any fair-minded citizen of the United States, who is capable of giving an opinion, think for a moment that the democratic party will give up their dearly bought "laurels," and succumb to a new party movement which has only existed a few days.

Neither of the old parties have any idea of giving away. Both may say, "come with us, and we will help you in your effort," but which of the parties are in earnest when they make such promises to the Alliance. That, of course, the members of the Alliance will decide for themselves.

That is the only way we think it possible for its members to effect the cure, so much desired, for rotten legislation, and forever crush the power of the moneyed demagogue and privileged aristocrat.

The Farmer's Alliance, which seems, from newspaper reports, to be assuming such vast proportions and so many think it will wield such an influence in politics in our government, is likely to meet with the same fate of all predecessors of like nature.

The cause is jeopardized by being in such haste, and a desire to do too much at one time, or wanting an immediate revolution in governmental affairs, the repealing or striking out of nine-tenths of the laws that are upon our statute-books, which were considered when made, good and wholesome laws, beneficial to the people. Now if the people of our government will work for this reformation; asking only for a few reforms at one time. They—in that way—will be likely to accomplish what is so much a necessity and desirable to that class of our citizens, whom the government should respect, and the monopoly are striving to push to the wall. It tickles the millionaire, the bondholder and the shysters of the world to see the people so anxious for a reform as to kill all their efforts through want of proper caution and judgement, striving to get all reforms necessary immediately.

Go slow, be cautious, if it is likely to hurt a just cause by asking for a dollar take a half and be satisfied to wait a short time for the remainder, which is infinitely better than a hasty movement, demanding more than we can reasonably expect to get; and by such demand imperil our cause, and probably swamp the whole plan of reformation be thrown further back in our efforts, for good, than we were at the beginning.

We cannot see any way of accomplishing what the people so much desire, hastily or immediately, except by—like Cromwell—dissolving the long Parliament; and that should not be thought of, for a moment, for that would be treason.

The question should be talked of and thought about. Clubs formed for the purpose of discussing plans and methods of bringing about the desired reform. The corrupt and weak legislation of our congress, shown up. Bringing the facts clearly demonstrated under the observation of party leaders in such a manner as will compel them to take cognizance, and disregard the wishes of the people at their peril.

HARNEY County will, in the near future have a railroad, and Burns the most important town in the county, is building up rapidly, considering the many difficulties with which she has to contend; her business men are alive to their own interest, and have a commendable pride in working for the interest of their town and county. Our town according to the number of inhabitants, has more than an average amount of intelligence and enterprise. This being the case we will certainly prosper, and the prosperity of the town, is evidence that the county is prospering.

HARNEY county is not a desert by any means. Her resources only need developing to show the outside world that we have a good and prosperous county. We undoubtedly have the foundation upon which to build; and labor, with a little capital, will cause the valley to put on a new dress, more becoming and more in accordance with our elder neighbors.

We have a large tract of level cultivable land in Harney valley, the most of which, at this time, produces a very fine quality of wild hay. The land is of a rich, deep soil, upon which can be raised large crops of barley, wheat, rye and oats. All the hardy vegetables are grown here without irrigation. Of course vegetables grow larger and yield more to the acre on the water courses, but nevertheless vegetables are grown here without water.

It is folly for men to say and write that Harney valley will never be prosperous country. To be sure we have frost here that sometimes does damage, but let the country that has no disadvantages "cast the first stone." The history of Eastern Oregon in districts, where at this time farming is a success, when first settled were in the same condition, and similar opinions entertained by some that is now promulgated by a few persons who have visited our county and left and some that still remain here; and that is, Harney valley is no good for anything.

The crop of grain and of vegetables last season were very good; and the indications are now that the coming season will be a prosperous one; there will be a larger acreage of grain sown than ever has been, and we cannot see any good reasons for condemning the country.

E. A. HEATH, editor of the Harney Press, who was arrested by U. S. Marshal W. W. Johnson, for publishing obscene articles in his paper, was tried before U. S. Commissioner W. W. Cardwell, last Friday, 20th inst., and held to appear before the U. S. court of the State in May, next. His bond was put at six hundred dollars.

It is our duty to make an explanation to the citizens of Harney and the friends to Mr. Heath. It is a well known fact that a damper has been thrown upon the friendly relations, that should exist between our town and Harney, by the county seat controversy, and the arrest of Mr. Heath only makes the matter worse, and it is nothing but fair and justice to the citizens of our town, to inform Harney that we candidly believe that not a half dozen persons of this town knew anything of the matter until the arrest was made. This being the facts in the case Harney should not condemn the whole town for a step taken by the Postoffice Department. It is reported that this action was brought about by a few individuals through personal prejudice and malice. If such was the case the whole town should not be stigmatized for the action of two or three persons. And furthermore the citizens of Burns—while not upholding any editor in publishing obscene or indecent communications—condemn any action taken through pure hatred and malice, which is likely to injure the individual arrested and also calculated to hurt our own town.

FROM THE CAPITOL.
HERALD'S WASHINGTON LETTER.
A Synopsis of a Week's Working at the White House.
[From our regular Correspondent.]
WASHINGTON, D. C. March 13, 1891.

Mr. Harrison is fortunate in being out of town this week. He escaped the first exuberance of the Blaine holwers, who have gone completely wild, because the alleged reciprocity treaty has been formally accepted by the Brazilian government, instead of being rejected as had been rumored, and because the British government has agreed to submit the Behring Sea dispute to arbitration, reserving the right to insist upon the payment of damages by this government for what it calls the illegal seizure of vessels sailing under the British flag. Before crowning Mr. Blaine king of the world of diplomacy the Blainians should procure a copy of the dispatch of Lord Salisbury, sent to the British minister here last Summer, which was a part of the correspondence submitted to Congress at the last session. They will find that the proposition then made by Great Britain to arbitrate was, with the exception that it included the Canadian fisheries dispute, substantially the same as that now accepted by Lord Salisbury. If there has been any diplomatic victory won in these negotiations Mr. Blaine was not its winner.

Notwithstanding the statement that Mr. Harrison had concluded not to make the appointments of the nine United States Judges until Congress met again, the republicans applicants for these life time positions are patiently waiting for him to return to the White House in order to renew the seige. His ostensible reason for going to Maryland was to shoot wild ducks, but I think that his real reason was to escape the importunities of the "lame ducks" of his party. It is thought here that he will make these appointments before going to the Pacific Coast in search of votes for the next republican national convention, and the vote hunting jaunt is to begin, very appropriately, in the neighborhood of the first of April. Attorney General Miller is said to be studying the law under which these judges are to be appointed, as doubts have been expressed of its constitutionality.

Secretary Foster is in Ohio, but there is quite as much consternation as there usually is upon a change of administration, and the impression is general that many heads are to fall in order to make places for Foster's machine republicans. Treasurer Huston is expected, to return to Washington to-morrow, but he will not say at the department, again, resume his duties, although his resignation has not been officially accepted. There is a well defined rumor here that Mr. Harrison will try to get rid of Huston by tendering him an important foreign mission. Private Secretary Halford says there is nothing in it, but it finds many believers nevertheless.

Last night at the hotel at which Hon. William R. Morrison lives, there was a gathering of delighted Illinois democrats exchanging congratulations upon the election of Gen. Palmer to the United States Senate, and no one expressed more pleasure than Mr. Morrison, who had been prominently mentioned as a candidate in case of the withdrawal of Palmer.

Republicans here take a special delight in the knowledge that the extravagant appropriations of the last congress will make a deficit in the Treasury which the incoming democratic Congress will have to provide for, either by reducing expenses or increasing taxation, and they actually have the "gall" to express their delight to democrats. Perhaps when the democratic House begins to show up some of the financial crookedness of the majority in the last Congress, as it is almost certain to do, these fellows will not feel quite so gleeful.

The Treasury department has notified the claim agents that all payments under the direct tax act will be made to the States in trust for citizens thereof from whom they were collected and that no one will be allowed to examine the direct tax records of the department unless authorized by one of the States to do so. This is a black eye to the fraternity of claim agents, but it would be safe to bet that copies of the department records were in the possession of favored individuals before the order was issued.
