Many Charged With the Same Crime. Red Bluff, May 14.—Henry K Long was held to answer before the Superior Court this morning for the murder of Oscar Crandall. The only direct evidence against Long was that of the Boyden brothers, one of whom is also charged with the crime, alleging that Long confessed committing the crime to them. A motion for the discharge of the prisoner was overruled. Grove L. Johnson and sons of Sacramento are Long's attorneys.

The examination of Mitchell Boyden and Hughes, charged with the same crime, is now proceeding. A motion for the release of Long upon bonds in any amount up to \$20,000 was taken under advisement.—S. F. Examiner.

FIRE.

The livery stable belonging to Mrs. M. A. Fry and run by Wm. Woods, was burned to the ground on Sunday night, the 17th inst. Origin of fire not known. The loss is estimated at \$3,000; no insurance. The fire when discovered was under such headway that no attempt was made to save the barn. There were 40 horses in the barn at the time, they were cut loose and all saved except three, one belonging to Wm. Woods, the proprietor, one to J. T. Silman and one to E. B. Hanly. The fire was first seen by L. J. Bosenburg, who keeps a saloon opposite where the barn stood, he immediately gave the alarm, in a short time nearly every man in town was there doing everything in his power to save the surrounding buildings, it required almost superhuman efforts to save the restaurant which stood by it. Everything in the barn was consumed. Harness, saddles, bridles, blankets, grain etc.
