Not Afraid of Coercion.

LONDON, May 5.—Something like dismay has been caused in British government circles by the news that Newfoundland has treated with contempt Lord Salisbury's menace of coercion. The general feeling is that the government has stupidly blundered on the Newfoundland question, and is in danger of greater blunders. Even leading conservatives acknowledge that France has beaten England in a game that from the first was what Americans call "bluff," and that the French have gained their sole object of creating a rankling irritation between England and one or more of her North American colonies, for Nova Scotia is well known to sympathize with Newfoundland. England says Sir William Whiteway has virtually consented in compliance with French demands that the Newfoundlanders should be warned off some 790 miles of coasting in order that the French may at any point they wish, erect temporary scaffolds to dry fish caught by seven small boats, for that was the whole French fleet last June, and seven acres would have been all that they could have put to practical use.—East Oregonian.

A Drunken Husband's Crime.

James Stewart, of Chartiersborough, Pa., murdered his wife, aged 30, last Sunday. Stewart came home drunk at supper time. He terrified his wife by curses, and when she tried to escape he threw a burning lamp at her. The lamp struck her on the breast, exploding and burning the woman so seriously that she died the next morning after a night of awful agony. Stewart was taken to Pittsburg and locked up.

Hebrew Persecution Renewed.

Corfu, May 13.—The anti-Hebrew excitement which has existed here for some time, and which caused an outbreak April 27th, resulted in a resumption of rioting yesterday.

Two Hebrews were killed and a number injured. The troops again dispersed the rioters and now surround the Hebrew quarter. Hebrews are forbidden to pass the troops, and stores kept by Hebrews are closed.

Died In Poverty.

A report to the department of the State regarding the death of General George Pomutz, formerly United States consul general at St. Petersburg, tells of his burial in Poter's Field, and ten years subsequently the discovery of valuable deeds and papers which had never been claimed.

General Pomutz was a brilliant soldier of the war, the friend and comrade of General Grant, and a prominent citizen in Keokuk, Iowa, and one of the most accomplished of the United States representatives abroad. He was appointed consul at St. Petersburg in February, 1866, and promoted to the consul generalship in 1874. He surrendered the office in 1878 to make room for a friend of the administration of President Hayes, and continued to live in St. Petersburg. Only a few years elapsed until his death, and the American residents made up a purse for his burial. No one appeared to claim the body. No one seems to have made any inquiry from Iowa as to the disposition of his property, and it is only by accident that Consul Crawford recently discovered that two locked boxes belonging to him contained records of his services and deeds to town lots and farms in Iowa and Missouri, representing a large amount of money.—E. Oregonian.
