Not always Fatal.

Our esteemed contemporary, the Baker City Democrat, devotes nearly a half a column of one of its recent issues, to a description of a very delicate surgical operation, called "Trephining of the Skull," that had been performed by two of her physicians. In its next issue we note the result of the operation, to-wit—death. We can improve, somewhat, on this case of our en- terprising friends, by reporting a case similar in every respect except as to result. Our resident physi- cian, Dr. Ashford, about six weeks ago, did the same operation and at present writing his patient is en- tirely well. He has the disc of the bone that was removed from the skull to show for the operation, be- sides the evidence of a half dozen reliable men and women who wit- nessed it.

We are not in the least inclined to find fault with the Democrat for reporting the case, but desire to call the attention of its readers to the fact that in the hands of competent surgeons the operation is not always necessarily fatal.
