DEFYING THE DUST.

Many Strange things have been told concerning the secrets of the grave. Within the past few months discoveries have been made in Missouri and Iowa that people have been buried alive, but the strangest discovery was made a few days ago at Colchester, Ill., viz: That, after having been buried twentyone years the body of Miss Flora Hume is in as perfect condition as the day she died.

Twenty-one years ago the young lady died in St Paul, of pneumonia and the body was brought to Colchester and buried in the Arygle cemetery. That cemetery has long since fallen into disuse and recently it was laid off in nicely improved grounds. The few graves in it were removed and among the dead was the body of Miss Hume. It was enclosed in a metallic case. This was covered with a thick coat of rust. When the cover was removed there lay the body perfectly intact. The features were readily recognized by relatives and the clothing looked perfectly fresh. Even a ribbon of delicate tint about the neck was as bright and fresh as when it had been first put on.

The face was not in the least discolored and the body was full and round. In fact the corpse looked as if it might have been buried only a few hours.—Republic.
