Thirty Hidden Skeletons.

Chicago, Ill., June 28.—Thirty skeletons were found in an old ice house in Chicago. For several days numerous complaints have been made to the Health Office and to the Deering street police by residents in the vicinity of Archer avenue and Hough place, who asserted that a nuisance of aggravating form made life almost unendurable. Investigations was made by both departments, but without locating the trouble. Yesterday the mystery was solved. Several boys found near the corner a human skull and several thigh bones, bleached white. The lads told the first policeman they met of their discovery, and he notified the Health Office. Dr. Ware, with several assistants, visited the scene and made a more thorough search than had before been made. A bad odor was detected from Schineman's old ice house on the corner. The searchers ripped up a part of the floor and were horrified to find rows of skeletons, to some of which shreds of flesh still clung. Who placed them there is not known, and the authorities will make every effort to find the guilty persons. The theory advanced by the health officers is that some attach of a medical college brought the subjects there to bleach. The bones were allowed to remain in the building until the matter can be more fully investigated.—Republic.

The Erratic Missouri.

The Missouri river cut through Doniphin Point, a few miles north of Atchison, and converted several Missouri farms into a vast island. The newly formed channel is getting wider every hour and it is feared that the entire current will change in less than forty-eight hours. This will leave a lake 8 miles in length in the old bed. The river has been rising rapidly for twenty-four hours, and an overflow is looked for in the bottom land affected by the cut.

Hostile Redskins.

Col. Corbin left Holbrook, Arizona, on the morning of June 23d, for Kern's Canyon, with two troops of the Tenth Cavalry under command of Major McEllan. At Kern's Canyon the force will be joined by two companies from Fort Wingate, also two more pieces of artillery. Col. Corbin is acting under the immediate orders of General McCook and will go directly to the seat of the disturbance.

It is stated by Lieutenant Brit that seventy or more of the hostiles are in the Orrible village of stone buildings situated on an elevation some thirty miles from Kern's Canyon and are very defiant.

It is said to be Colonel Corbin's purpose to arrest the ring leaders and medicine men and remove them from their tribes for a time at least. This he hopes to do without serious trouble. The country is very dry, there having been little or no rain in the country since March, so the movement of troops is a difficult problem.
