BURNS HAD ANOTHER FIRE.

The residence of W. W. Cardwell was destroyed by fire on the night of 3d inst or rather the morning of the 4th the fire being first seen about three o'clock A. M.

Mr. and Mrs. Cardwell left the house about 9 P. M. to attend a dance given at the town hall, neither of them can account for the origin of the fire, there was no fire made in the cook stove after the noon meal, the family eating a lunch for supper. Every thing they possessed in the way of furniture and clothing—except what they were wearing—was burned, also \$200 in Greenbacks.

Mr. Cardwell estimates his loss at \$2500. The house and furniture was partially insured.
