## Board of Trade.

## The Land Grant Cases Again.

Several days since a dispatch from Washington stated that Mr. A. H. Tanner had been appointed to assist United States Attorney F. P. Mays in the prosecution of the suit of the United States against the Central Military Road Company, of Willamette Valley, and Cascades Wagon Road Company, and The Dalles Military Wagon Road Company, to have the land grants of those roads forfeited. The cases were tried before Judge Deady some time since and a decision given in favor of the defendants, which decision was confirmed by Judge Sawyer. The cases were then appealed to the supreme court of the United States and by that tribunal sent back to Judge Deady's court for a new trial. Mr. W. Carey Johnson, who was appointed to assist United States Attorney McArthur in prosecuting the cases, being unable to attend to the business any longer on account of poor health, Mr. Tanner has been appointed in his place, and yesterday an order was made allowing him to appear as attorney for the plaintiffs.

The cases are to be tried anew from the beginning, and Mr. Mays and Mr. Tanner are hard at work getting things in readiness to begin the taking of testimony before the examiner in chancery, Mr. George H. Durham. This will occupy several months. As the grants to the roads were made in '64, '66 and '67 and the work was to be completed within five years, it will be necessary to hunt up witnesses who were familiar with the work done on the roads in these years, from '64, to '72, many of whom are dead and many more of whom it will be difficult to find.—Oregonian.
