IS ALUM POISONOUS? [Hall's Journal of Health.]

deal of discussion Alum is used by in the eastern stores. many bakers to whiten their bread. enabling them to use inferior flour. It is most extensively employed as a cheap substitute for cream of tartar in the manufacture of baking powders. It has not been considered immediately dangerous; although if centinued it induces dys pepsia and obstinate constipation. But the fact that many cases of poisoning have occured from the use of alum, puts the question in a' more

serious aspect, and prudent people will exercise caution in the selection of baking powders."

"Under what conditions then, does this substance-formerly used only for mechanical or medicinal purposes-become poisonous? They are certainly obscure, and at present we can only surmise what they may be We suspect that the cause ex ists in the individual poisoned; some peculiarity of the constitution pro ducing a morbid change in the secretions of the stomach, with which

the alum combines and forms an RISING SUN active poison; or the secretions may be healthy but in unusual propor tions, and that these less or greater proportions in combination with the alum constitute a poison." .

"For example, two parts of mercury and two parts of chlorine form calomel, which is not poisonous, but change the proportions to ono part mercury and two parts of chlorine. and we get corrosive sublimate, which is a deadly poison."

"Then again we know nothing of the constitutional peculiarities. Why is it that one person can eat all kinds of green fruits and vegetables with impunity, while the same course might cost another individual his life? One person can handle poison ivy and sumac without being in the least effected; another is poisoned if he approaches to within ten feet of them. Out of a family in a malarial district. some of the members will suffer half the year with fever and ague, while the others will enjoy excellent health during the entire year. Foods that are wholesome to some persons are actually poisonous to others. 





New Orleans, Sept. 3.-Secretary Hester of the Cotton Exchange to day completed the final details of the cotton crop movement, principal figures of which were is ued on the first. His introductory re marks state that the cotton crop of the United States for the year end 8.652.579, the largest crop ever grown by 1,341,275. In reference to receipts at the American ports. Mr. Hester said that, with the enormous crop, movements in every direction have been correspondingly heavy. New Orleans has handled more cotton than in any year, but one, of her history-her net receipts Following is the list compiled from exceeding 2 000,000 of bales for the ing within 60,000 of those in 1860, the largest ante-bellum vear.

Galveston has passed the million mark for the first time. and Savannah has handled cosiderably more than a million bales. exceeding all previous records. The gross overland movement for the year, after different points of crossing and reshipping into the cotton belt, has reached, 1,538,260 bales, exceeding last year by 184.970, and the year before by 182,689.
