## A Relic at Roseburg.

An article in last week's Review, regarding the exhibition at Trevet (or Trier, as the Germans call it) cathedral, in Rhennish Prussia, of the coat supposed to have been worn by the Savior, caused the production of a souvenir of its first exhibition this century. This relic is the property of Mrs. John Long, of Coles valley, and was presented to her by her mother who received it when a child but 4 years old, in 1810. It consists of a piece of silk cloth, 7x11 inches in size, embroidered about the edges. In the center is a small needle worked fac simile of the coat, coarsely woven to represent the texture of the sacred garment to which it has been touched. Below it are the letters A. J. H. S. and the date, 1810. It is in a well preserved condition although 81 years old. This is a very rare relic aside from its sacredness in the belief of all good Catholics, and it is doubtful if there are many of them on this side of the Atlantic. Mrs. Long's mother has also a souvenir of the 1844 exhibition. This coat is supposed to be the one for which the soldiers cast lots after the crucifixion.—Review.
