BUYERS of beef cattle may not be aware of the fact that we have in Harney county beef cattle in numbers sufficient to warrant buyers to come here to purchase, but such however is the fact, and beef of a quality just as good as can be bought elsewhere. Because we have two or three large cattle owners running stock in Harney, and who generally market their cattle themselves, does not signify that they necessarily buy the beef cattle belonging to the smaller stock men. Such—so we are informed—is not the case. We desire to disabuse the minds of outside buyers, of the impression that there are no beef cattle here to sell. We are informed that beef cattle have been selling very readily and at fair prices, in the John Day, Long Creek, Fox Valley and South Fork, neighborhoods, and it is not much further to come here after beef, and we believe, if it was generally known among cattle buyers that we have beef for sale, that there would be no trouble in disposing of all the beef we have in our country and at fair prices.

City of Mexico, Sept. 3.—The Anglo-American says a prominent gentleman of this city, well known in the Anglo-American colony, received the following dispatch in cipher:

VALPARAISO, Sept. 1.

"President Balmaceda is aboard the Condell, and expects to disembark in San Francisco. However, as he is pushed by the Insurgents' warships he may land in Mexico. If he does, extend all possible courtesies."

Whatever port the fleeing President will make, he will be protected. No warship will attempt his capture within a marine league of Mexico or the United States. If Balmaceda lands in Mexico he will receive the hospitality that the constitution grants to all political refugees.

Pennsylvania Democrats.

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 3.—At 10 o'clock this morning the democratic state convention was called to order. Four hundred and sixty one delegates were present. H. Willis Bland, of Reading, was chosen temporary chairman. In his speech Bland said: "The campaign should be fought on a local footing, not on a national. Nobody doubts that the people of Pennsylvania love the teachings of their prophet, Grover Cleveland, (tremendous applause.) It is our duty to the people that we turn out the republican vampires who are prostituting the public offices all over the state."

The platform adopted by the democratic state convention says: "We are in favor of an honest, economical administration of public affairs, limiting expenses and reducing taxation to meet the actual necessities of the government; of a solid and staple currency, based on gold and silver coined and circulated in such proportions as will keep them on a parity; of a reform and revision of the tariff."
