Suicide of John Moore by Taking "Rough on Rats."

John Moore, a shoe fitter, died in San Francisco a few days ago, from the effect of a dose of "rough on rats," taken with suicidal intent. Moore was 30 years of age and a native of Wales. He was found dead in bed at his home at 33 Alvarado street.

He was the son of Robert Moore, of the firm of Mattern & Moore, leather merchants of 25 New Montgomery street. Several days ago he returned to that city from Santa Cruz, where he had been for several months. He had been drinking heavily for some time and for this had often been reprimanded by his brother. On a table near his bedside was found the following note: Dear Father: Forgive me for what I have done, and kiss my mother and sister for me.

The Coroner was notified of the suicide and the remains were removed to the Morgue. The parents of the deceased are at Santa Cruz and a younger brother went there to break the sad news.
