WASHINGTON, Oct. 12. '91 Mr Harrison, who once snubbed Mr. J. S. Clarkson most unmercifully, according to republican authority, has suddenly discovered the greatness which that gentleman carries concealed somewhere about his person, and, presto change! Mr. Clarkson is the sole companion of long Presidential drives and has the the honor of being dined at the White House. It is but a repetition of the old. old story, "circumstances alter cases." When Mr. Clarkson was a very sore-headed minor official, mad because the newly elected President refused to have him in nis cabinet, Mr. Harrison, who had not then began to think of a renomination, did not hesitate to let it be known how little he thought Clark. For amounted to; out now things have changed. Mr. Clarkson is "Ross" of the National committee of his party, and even if some people do say that his "boss" is Quay. Mr. Harrison regards him as being of sufficient importance to be conciliated at the present stage of the game, and Mr. Clarkson seems in no way loth to being conciliated. and Senator Quay has left the Penn evlvania campaign long enough to come to Washington to see what there is "in it" for him.
