BROTHER HARRISON UNEASY.

Reports From Ohio Begin to Worry the Little Man—The Tariff Will Not Down.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Reports from Ohio are giving Bro. Harrison considerable uneasiness. The administration has been very anxious, of course, that Mr. McKinley should be sustained in Ohio, and that the robber tariff bill should be given prestige of approval by the Ohio People. The failure of all efforts to dodge the tariff question and switch the campaign off to silver has increased this anxiety, but now there is another and, to Mr. Harrison, a more serious occasion for apprehension. Some of the lieutenants of Major McKinley imagine they have discovered that the democrats are more anxious to secure the Legislature than they are to elect Campbell and that the prospects for their succeeding in the Legislature, if in nothing else, is sufficient to occasion the administration considerable worryment.

The republicans are on the run on the tariff fight. The more that question is discussed the less bright become McKinley's prospects for election. The determination of Mr. Campbell not to be side-tracked on silver and the masterful stroke of Mr. Mills in driving silver to the back and sealing the tariff as the issue have very seriously embarrassed the robber barons. A prominent and very sanguine republican said to day that if McKinley got no more than 10,000 or 12,000 would be no sort of vindication of his tariff bill and would count for nothing as prestige for the republican party in the campaign next year, while the loss of the Legislature would probably result in the reappointment of the state according to the plan adopted in Michigan, which would assure to the democrats some sixteen electoral votes.

If the situation becomes desperate enough the managers may even go to the extreme of sacrificing McKinley or what would amount to the same, of lessening their efforts in his behalf and leave him to his own resources, which would inevitably bring upon him defeat. The democrats, while they regard Ohio as a republican state, and will feel that they have won considerable of a victory if McKinley is elected by only a small majority, are receiving such favorable reports from all parts of the state that they are led to expect the election of Campbell and the control of the Legislature.

Viewed With Alarm.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 14.—The friends of Senator Sherman are just now considerably annoyed because of the renewed activity, apparent in all parts of the state, of the Foraker men, who boldly declare that their favorite is in the lead in the event the republicans have a working majority in the next Legislature. It is a noteworthy fact that Ex-

Governor Foraker is not only making a personal canvass, but his friends are active in their work from one end of the state to the other. Foraker's speeches during the campaign have been of the most effective character, eclipsing in point of dignity any he has heretofore delivered since he entered public life. His friends assert that he has quite as good a chance of election as Sherman, while the more enthusiastic say his chances are even better than those of the senior Senator.

while the friends of Sherman feel confident, they are vigilant and watching the corners very closely. They are free to concede that Foraker is a very shrewd politician, and one calculated to prove a most dangerous competitor in the race. Senator Sherman is not idle by any means. He apparently recognizes the fact that he will have to play his hand for all it is worth if he wins.

A gentleman from North Carolina writes for information about Roseburg and Oregon. Among other things he wants to know if the "inhabitants are kind and hospitable." It is quite evident that the North Carolina mind needs enlightenment as to the true standing of Oregon in this particular. The gentleman has evidently been reading the reports of Dr. Lane, late superintendent of the asylum for insane, and Dr. Rowland, his successor, or else he has run across the late copies of the East Oregon Republican and the La Grande Chronicle, whose editors evince anything but a "kind and hospitable" spirit. A missionary should be sent to North Carolina and also to many other of the Southern and Eastern states to remove the impression that Oregon is a "bad man's" country.—Plaindealer.
