

Arrested for Attempt to Commit Rape.

On Thursday Frank Vanina entered complaint against Thos. Porfili for attempting to commit a rape on his (Vanina's) wife and daughter. The complaint alleges that on Thursday of last week when Mr. Vanina was away from home, Porfili came to Vanina's house and attempted to rape Mrs. Vanina, and failing in this he assaulted the daughter, a girl some thirteen years of age. Sheriff Booth arrested Porfili on Thursday and brought him to town. He is an Indian, and speaks very poor English, but is able to stoutly deny the charges against him.—Ochsco Review.

THE SPIRIT MEDIUM.

Extract from the Spokane Review of Oct. 20, 1891: Jules Wallace the Australian medium, who has created such a furor throughout the city for the past few weeks, attracted and highly entertained another crowded house at Concordia hall last Sunday night by his peculiar doings and the reading of remarkable messages from the dead.

The evening exercises were opened at about 8:15 o'clock by Mr. Wallace making a few witty, and in some instances rather caustic, remarks about the treatment he had received at the hands of a local newspaper.

After a few more remarks, in which he humorously scorched a local judge whom he contended had endeavored to injure him, he proceeded with his seance by singing a song of his own composition, and in his own style. He then challenged any physician in the audience to write a prescription, seal it in an envelope, and he would read it sealed; and after composing himself in a chair for a few moments he arose and standing in a sort of

dazed condition, delivered a message from three spirits of the same name, which were recognized by a young man in the audience as his mother, aunt and grandmother. The medium by taking hold of the young man's hand told him of some incidents in his life, which he acknowledged as being correct in every particular.

The next message was to Thomas Keene, the tragedian, who was in the audience, and it came from his sister, giving the full name, telling him what he should do in the future. Mr. Koone acknowledged the correctness of the message. After delivering several other messages that were recognized as true the medium took a seat at a table on the stage and wrote some twenty or thirty messages, nearly all of which were recognized by the people in the audience.

BANK ROBBERY.

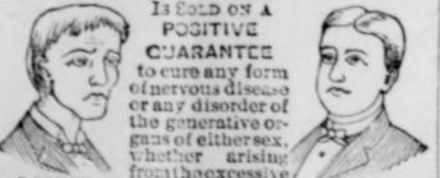
