ST. PETETSBURG, Nov. 12.—The authorities of the famine-stricken province of Samara are dealing with a new evil in the shape of an invasion of Mormon missionaries from America. These are conducting an active campaign among the poor peasants, who are induced by circumstances to believe any story about the promised land being at a distance away from Russia. The Mormons invariably select for their victims families that have girls. They describe their home in America as a land flowing with milk and honey, and just the place for starving peasants. The latter are led to part with their little belongings at any price and undertake a journey to America. The authorities are at last aroused to the determination to put down Mormonism in Samara, and the missionaries will have to seek pastures new.—World.

An Old Story.

The Independence West Side says: How many of our readers know the origin of the name "Long Tom," given to that stream emptying into the Willamette south of Corvallis?
