Mrs. Thompson's maiden name was Mary Machett. When 16 she married George Swearinger. They were granted a divorce, and she married George Thompson, who was sentenced to prison for some offence.

She got a divorce during his imprisonment, but on his release married him again. This time Mrs. Thompson concluded that two years' experience would satisfy her ambition and Mr. Thompson was permitted to go his way.

The fickle woman's fancy at once turned to husband No. 1, and after a short courtship husband and wife were again united.

Thompson went West and amassed a fortune. He was absent several years. During this time Swearinger and his wife tired of the partnership they had entered into, and the knot was again untied.

Thursday Thompsons were renewed, and husband No. 2 took upon himself the responsibilities of a protector. Mrs. Thompson now expresses herself as supremely content.—The Republic.

Dynamite in a Baggage Car.

A trunk containing dynamite exploded on the evening of the 23d ult., in the baggage car of the Western mail on the Pennsylvania railroad as the train was passing Irvin, Pa. The explosion tore out one side of the car and wrecked the trunk, scattering the contents over the tracks. The baggage-master accidentally hit the trunk while pulling another down, thereby causing the explosion. The trunk was shipped from Phillipsburg, Pa., by Michael Gody, who was on his way to Cambridge, O. He was arrested with his wife when the train reached Pittsburg. He denied that the trunk was his, but when confronted with the picture of his wife, which was found in the car, he acknowledged the ownership. He would assign no reason for carrying the dynamite and was locked up. It is the intention of the railroad company to prosecute him.

In the Nez Pesce campaign Col. Frank Parker, now editor of the Walla Walla Statesman, was a scout under Gen. Howard. One day he came near being drowned in the Yellowstone river. A soldier rescued him, just who was not exactly known. That was in '77 says the colonel. "Since then the man who saved me that day from a watery grave in the icy Yellowstone has been turning up three or four times a year. That little incident that day in the Yellowstone has cost me at least calculation from \$800 to \$1000 in tokens of gratitude and drinks for my rescuer. I've done the proper thing with most

every survivor of that campaign in the northwest, but I've an idea that the man who really pulled me out of the river that day is yet to be heard from."—Albany Democrat

Da Fonseca Resigns.

London, Nov. 23.—A dispatch from Rio de Janeiro says President da Fonseca has resigned in favor of Floriano Peixotto. The news that Fonseca has resigned spread like wildfire. Everywhere it was received with enthusiastic cheers and exclamations of satisfaction. The Provinces have not yet been heard from, but it is believed from the advices hitherto received in regard to the growing opposition throughout the country to Fonseca's supremacy that the news of his downfall will everywhere be received with the same satisfaction as at the capital. The revolution at Rio Janeiro only broke out this morning and its work was quickly accomplished.

The girl was taken to the Magdalen Home, East Portland at the request of her parents, and Sheriff Smith is of the opinion that it is her earnest desire to reform. The Magdalen Home is now open to wayward girls of all ages. The building is neat and the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, who are in charge, have every facility for caring for the girl entrusted to their care.—Oregonian.
